

Investigation of Corner On Auto Stocks Started

New York, April 9.—The New York Stock Exchange today started an investigation of this week's trading in Stromberg Carbuorator and refused to accept Allan A. Ryan's terms for settlement with other members of the exchange who were short in Stromberg when trading in the latter was suspended by the exchange. Both Stromberg and Stutz are controlled by Ryan.

The committee on business conduct of the exchange orders members to report immediately all their transactions in Stromberg from Monday to Thursday inclusive with prices and names of customers.

With the announcement that Chas. A. Morse, president of the Association of Stock Exchange Firms had been selected chairman of a committee to handle the interest of the shorts in Stutz, it was revealed that the stock exchange had a list of names accounting for a short interest of more than 10,000 shares.

When Ryan's plan for settlement was rejected overtures were made for a compromise. The opinion in the street today was that if no agreement could be reached legal proceedings would be instituted by calling for delivery of stock by shorts. Ryan today withdrew his advertisements offering to buy Stutz.

Stutz was quoted at 391 when trading was suspended, having risen from 390. Recently it sold at auction at 701. Stromberg opened at 119 today, half a point off, then declined eight points.

Canada Opposed To Bonus For Veterans

Ottawa, Ont., Apr. 9.—Sir George Foster, acting premier of Canada, announced today that the dominion government has not changed its opposition to a cash bonus for returned soldiers.

"The government," he said, "is not of the opinion and never has been that the best way to reconstitute, re-establish and readjust the returned soldier is to give him a cash bonus."

Strike Discussed By Portland Men

Portland, Or., April 9.—Switchmen and yardmen employed in the railroad yards were reported to be meeting today at Albina, near here, where the Oregon-Washington railroad and navigation company are located. No announcement was made relative to the purpose of the meeting. None of the yard employees of the Southern Pacific, Spokane, Portland and Seattle, or the O. W. R. and N. had left their posts. It was reported by railroad officials, and they assumed that the meeting was being attended only by men off duty.

PAPERS RAISE PRICES
Los Angeles, Cal., Apr. 9.—Publishers here announced Monday that the price of morning papers on streets and newsstands would be advanced May 1 from 5 to 6 cents on week days and that the price of two afternoon papers now selling for 2 cents would be advanced to 3 cents, while a third afternoon paper now selling for 1 cent would be advanced to 2 cents.

One of the largest plant factories in Great Britain is to be reopened with the understanding that the workers are to have a voice in the operation of the plant. With more than 600,000 wage earners in its over 12,000 manufacturing establishments, Massachusetts ranks third of the state in the average number of wage earners.

Former Portland Writer Reported Shot In Finland

Chicago, Apr. 9.—An unconfirmed report that John Reed, magazine writer, had been executed in Finland, has been received here. Lloyd B. Heth, assistant district attorney, announced this morning.

Reed is under indictment here, charged with conspiracy to advocate the overthrow of the government by force.

John Reed, mentioned in the above dispatch, is a former Portland man. His parents still reside in that city.

Ford-Newberry Election Probe Ordered At Once

Washington, Apr. 9.—The senate elections committee today ordered a full and immediate investigation of the Ford-Newberry election by the subcommittee of which Senator Watson, republican, Indiana, is chairman, and which will be appointed for the purpose of recounting the ballots cast in Michigan for candidates.

LONG TOW COMPLETED
Victoria, B. C., Apr. 9.—Completing what marine men said was the longest tow ever made on the Pacific ocean, the Vancouver tug Hero entered the Straits of Juan De Fuca today with the disabled power schooner Laurel Whalen tugging astern. The Hero towed the schooner from the Tahiti islands. A stop was made at Honolulu for fuel. The Laurel Whalen was disabled by storms in the South Pacific several months ago.

More than 23,000 workmen were employed at the Merchant Shipyard, Harbin, Pa., last year in order to maintain an average working force of 9,000, making the labor turnover for the year 334 per cent.

Lee Opposed To Recognition Of Union Strikers

Cleveland, O., Apr. 9.—W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, is strongly opposed to any attempt on the part of the federal board of mediation and conciliation or any other department to recognize the insurgent element in any effort to settle the strike of Chicago railroad yard employees, in the fight of the brotherhood and the switchmen's union of North America against the insurgents.

Mr. Lee today received a letter from W. L. Chambers, commissioner of the United States board of mediation and conciliation, saying the services of the board would be available if requested.


Belgians Assist French In Move

Coblenz, Apr. 9.—Notification was given today through the Belgian military mission here of the formal participation of Belgium in the French action in occupying Frankfurt. Belgium is sending a detachment of troops with the French to mark its co-operation in the move.

Wilbur Is Being Returned Today

Oakland, Cal., Apr. 9.—A writ of habeas corpus obtained by Julius Wilbur after he was arrested here on a telegraphic warrant from Salem, was granted in superior court today. Wilbur was taken into custody by the Oregon authorities and is en route to Salem in their custody.
