Issue Of \$23,500 Of Aurora School Bonds Is Approved

With every vote in the district accounted for, the Aurora-Clackamas joint district approved the issue of \$23,500 worth of bonds for the purpose of building a high school plant at Aurora.

Of the 117 school voters in the district, 62 favored the measure, while 54 attempted to ballot it down. One ballot was unmarked. The election, which was held April 12, is the result of a fight for school improvements which has been progressing there for some time.

Los Angeles, Apr. 14.—The Santa Fe railroad, which had fifteen passenger trains tied up at desert point last night and early today as one result of "insurgent" switchmen's strike, announced today that it now had all fifteen trains slowly moving toward their destinations. Most of them were west-bound.

Federal Troops And Insurgents In Battle Today

Masterful in every respect was the lecture-recital given last evening in the First Methodist church by Ralph I. Thomas. This was the opening num-

ber of the Willamette University Lyceum course and gives promise of a series of very worth-while entertainments. Miss Mary Notson assisted Mr. Thomas, supplying the interpretation of a short story and taking the part of Lady Thania in the two scenes from "A School for Scandal."

Mr. Thomas' recital was pronounced equal to anything put on in the great schools of expression in Boston. The arena scene from "Quo Vadis," he held his audience tense to his every movement, bound by his strength of interpretation. To the dramatic lyrics selected from the works of Robert and Elizabeth Browning Mr. Thomas had given deep study, and was able to bring to his audience a deep appreciation of their beauty. A far different vein was touched in his Riley selection "A Home Made Fairy Tale," where whimsical imagination lent an atmosphere of rollicking fancy. Local hits, carefully aimed, brought down the house in the modern monologue "At the Glee Club Concert," in which Mr. Thomas played the part of a frivolous young lady. "America for Me," one of Van Dyke's poems, received the touch which sent the words "Home again" ringing in every heart. Through the various illustrations, each differing from the other in form and in feeling, Mr. Thomas kept up the corresponding changes in realization.
