

### Dodson Predicts Great Business Future in State

Predicting a great future for Oregon, the Willamette valley and the northwest generally, "if all persons will lay aside their personal differences and bank fights that we sometimes see on all sides here, and reap the reward that will be greater than ever before," W. D. Dodson, executive secretary of the Portland chamber of commerce, talked before the business men's luncheon at the Commercial club this noon.

"The eyes of the east are turned upon the Oregon country," Mr. Dodson said, "and it won't be long before individual as well as collective manufacturers will be lining the valley with factories and industries of various kinds."

**Manufactures to Come.**  
Mr. Dodson recently returned from the east where he made an extensive survey of business conditions there. He told the business men that he talked to manufacturers in more than 50 of the largest plants east of the Alleghenys, "and more than 50 per cent of them have their plans shaped so that include activity here in this state," he declared.

Mr. Dodson told of his conference in Washington, D. C., with Admiral Benson of the United States shipping board and of his assurance that sea facilities would be opened wide to Oregon shippers. There is now a line from Portland to almost all ports in the world; Mr. Dodson said "that enable the shippers of this state to market their products in almost any port in the world at a lower cost than they can in coast market." The coming of ocean going vessels to Portland spells much in the industrial development of the state, the secretary said.

**Western Possibilities Seen.**  
With fuel conditions in the east so critical manufacturers are compelled to look elsewhere for this product, and learning that great possibilities present themselves in this state to utilize charcoal as fuel, are investigating conditions here with a view of establishing great manufacturing. Only one thing is lacking so far in this state that tends to discourage great manufacturers, Mr. Dodson declared, and that is iron. Even now eastern interests have men in the state searching carefully for this product in an effort to open up great channels of endeavor in Oregon.

"The water power that abounds in the northwest is also very attractive to eastern manufacturers, Mr. Dodson said, in that it does away with the need of fuel, and renders manufacturing more economical than with the use of fuel. Mr. Dodson said that water power in the northwest equals that power that might be furnished with 250,000 tons of coal a year.

"The time will come when the Willamette valley will be the greatest lumber manufacturing center in the world," asserted Mr. Dodson. "This state is due for bigger and better things in a business way than ever before. Yet when I get up in Portland and make this optimistic talk of mine," he added with a smile, "I hear men say 'hushwah!' 'bull!' and 'get out.' I regret that they cannot see just what lays so short away ahead."

**Senator Pierce Talks.**  
Senator Walter Pierce, from eastern Oregon, made a short talk introducing Arthur C. Foster, who will talk at the Commercial club before the public tonight on the Non-Partisan league's operations in North Dakota. The meeting begins at 8 o'clock. Senator Pierce will also talk.

In his introductory speech this noon, the senator declared that the spread of socialism, communism and radicalism is sweeping toward this state, and added: "If you value your government as I do, and see the opportunities that present themselves for its destruction through such organization, it is time we put our shoulder to the wheel and try to preserve it."
