

Governor Leads Crusade Against High Costs Today

The vanguard of the anti-high-cost clothing army arrived in the capital this morning and made camp under the dome of the state house. Governor Olcott appeared for duty garbed in a suit which has carried him through many a strenuous contest on the golf course while State Treasurer O. P. Hart defies the clothing profiteers in a suit which is now doing duty for its seventh consecutive year. R. A. Harvath, member of the state industrial cabinet department, and who fathered the old clothing move at the capitol, is arrayed in a Y. M. C. A. uniform which has seen many months service overseas and many other employees who were in the ranks or held commissions during the world war have impressed their uniforms into service in the present campaign. "Gorduroy," khaki and a few blue denims are also doing duty today. The great mass of the army of state house employees who are enlisted in the present move, however, are awaiting the arrival of new khaki uniforms before undertaking active participation in the campaign against high priced clothes.

John L. Oliver Found Dead In Bed This Morning

John L. Oliver, 61, a prominent orchardist of the Michigan City community, just across the river in Polk county, was found dead in bed at his home this morning. Oliver had been in good health upon his retirement Sunday night and his death was not noticed until, failing to arise at his usual time, members of the family went to call him. Oliver was born in Springfield, Ill., coming to Oregon in 1889. He had been a resident of Polk county for the past fourteen years, engaging in horticulture. He is survived by his widow and three children: Buri R. and Bertha Oliver of Portland and Marjorie Oliver of Michigan City, Or. Oliver was a member of the First Christian church of Salem. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Battle Between Rebel And Federal Forces Imminent

Washington, April 26.—A battle between Mexican federal troops sent out from the port of Mazatlan to meet the revolutionists marching

on that place is imminent, according to advices received here today. The revolutionary army under General Angel Flores is rapidly approaching Mazatlan, the advices said, while the federal forces have withdrawn to within 46 miles of the city. In retreating the federal troops are said to have burned bridges and to have thrown up fortifications.

Justice Burnett In Auto Smash; Boy Is Bruised

An auto driven by Judge George H. Burnett, of the supreme court, and carrying Mrs. Burnett, sustained considerable damage and Noel Adelhart, riding a motorcycle, sustained bruises and was badly shaken up when the machine and motorcycle collided Saturday evening at the corner of Twelfth and Ferry streets. Justice Burnett was driving south on Twelfth street and was turning east on Ferry, and Adelhart with his motorcycle was going north on Twelfth street and the

accident occurred in trying to avoid collision with another auto. It was necessary to jack up the auto to get the motorcycle from beneath, it being wedged in tight from the contact. Report of the accident was made to police by Judge Burnett. Another collision between autos driven by T. C. Roberts and E. L. Benedict, at the corner of Capitol and Center streets, was reported by Traffic Officer Moffitt Sunday. A special election at Davenport resulted in voting down by a vote of 289 to 29 a proposal to levy an extra 8 mill school tax.
