**Monmouth Gives Royal Welcome to Jersey Men**

Monmouth, May 6.—About sixty cars conveying the Oregon Jersey Breeders' association, numbering more than two hundred, stopped in front of the normal school campus yesterday on schedule time. The party left Portland in the morning, stopping en route at some of the noted Jersey farms on the west side of the river. The first stop made in Polk county was at the Wm. Marrow farm eight miles west of Salem where his herd of fancy Jerseys were viewed for a half hour. The tourists then drove to Monmouth by way of Independence and were met here with a hearty welcome by hundreds of people from different parts of the county. Among the guests were H. G. Van Pelt, editor of the Dairy Farmer at Waterloo, Iowa; H. W. Gow, of New York, secretary of the American Jersey Cattle club; Mr. McMonnies, a representative of the New York Jersey bulletin, and other distinguished breeders. The party announced at the time of arrival here that M. D. Munn of St. Paul, president of the American Jersey Cattle club, had been side tracked at McMinnville and would join the company at Albany.

The committee expected, and had previously arranged to serve three hundred people, but it is estimated that more than five hundred were served. A record attendance and an interesting program after lunch characterized Monmouth's part in the Oregon Jersey Jubilee. The affair was a complete success and marked by lively interest throughout.

The ladies of Monmouth served the company with remarkable efficiency. For nearly an hour a string of people passed in front of the table where the service was cheerfully rendered.

Immediately after lunch a serpentine parade by the normal school girls opened the program. After parading the campus for several minutes they marched to the auditorium where singing and speaking afforded entertainment. One beautiful feature of the program was a milk maid drill and song by ten little girls. The Oregon Jersey male quartet, a talented bunch of Jersey men picked up for this occasion from Coos, Washington, Yamhill and Linn counties, rendered an appropriate selection. Hugh G. VanPelt of Waterloo, Iowa, was the principal speaker and delivered a short but interesting address. His speech was punctuated with wit and a number of forceful illustrations.

At 1:30 the party left for the G. G.

Hewett and Frank Loughal farms in the Lacklamute valley where they viewed some of the best Jerseys to be found in the northwest. It was nearly four o'clock before the party left for Albany. They will be in Salem this afternoon.

The eastern Jersey men spoke in highest terms of the Willamette valley, and Mr. Gow said, in his address here, that it is the most beautiful spot he has been privileged to visit in this world.

The affair has seemed to stir up considerable enthusiasm in all parts of the valley and there are probably more Jersey admirers in Oregon today than there was before they arrived.

**COOKIES and SMALL CAKES**

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

WHEN the children romp in hungry as young bears, here are some wholesome, economical delights that will not only be received with glee, but will satisfy the most ravenous appetite in a most wholesome manner.

- Cookies**  
 1/2 cup shortening  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup milk  
 2 eggs  
 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg  
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract or grated rind of 1 lemon  
 4 cups flour  
 2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
- Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add nutmeg and flavoring; add 2 cups flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.
- Cocoa Drop Cakes**  
 4 tablespoons shortening  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 egg  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1/2 cup flour  
 3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
 1/2 cup cocoa  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; beat well and add milk slowly; sift flour, baking powder, salt and cocoa into mixture; stir until smooth, add vanilla. Put one tablespoon of batter into each greased muffin tin and bake in moderate oven about 30 minutes. Cover with boiled icing.

**Orange Cakes**  
 4 tablespoons shortening  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1 egg  
 2 cups flour  
 2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon orange extract  
 1/2 cup grated rind of 1 orange

Cream shortening; add sugar slowly, beating well; add milk a little at a time; then add well-beaten egg; sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to mixture; add flavoring and grated orange rind; mix well. Bake in greased shallow tin, or individual cake tins, in hot oven 15 to 20 minutes. When cool cover with orange icing.
