

Realter Must Go Back And Answer For Alleged Crime

Everett Philpots or E. M. Padden, Portland realty dealer, must return to Nashville, Tenn., to face charges of false pretenses said to involve all the way from \$6000 to \$40,000. Governor O'Connell this morning on receipt of word from A. L. Veazie of Portland, attorney for Philpots, to the effect that no settlement would be made by the Tennessee authorities, that the extradition papers would be honored.

Philpots, it is understood here, has asked to be allowed until Saturday night to straighten out his business affairs in Portland and this time will be granted, the governor stated.

Sheriff Wright is here from Nashville to return Philpots to the Tennessee city for trial.

Jury's Findings In Hoff Case Due

The report of the Marion county grand jury in the probe of the bond buying policies of State Treasurer O. P. Hoff will be presented to Circuit Judge George G. Bingham at 4 o'clock this afternoon. It was authoritatively stated this morning.

The report was completed late Thursday afternoon but because of the absence of both Judge Bingham and Judge Percy R. Kelly, who are holding court in Albany, the same could not be filed until this afternoon when Bingham will come up long enough to receive the report and dismiss the grand jury which has been in session intermittently for the past month.
