Agriculturist May Be Procured In This County

The advisability of employing a county agricultural agent for Marion county is being investigated by a committee named at the meeting in Hubbard on Thursday night of the Marion County Community Federation. It was announced here following the meeting by delegates who represented the Salem Commercial club. Much discussion centered around the topic in the meeting, the consensus of opinion favoring the employment of a capable man for that position.

The federation held one of its best meetings when the delegates and the townspeople gathered in the city hall at Hubbard. More than 200 persons were present. Refreshments and entertainment were features of the occasion. T. E. McCroskey, manager of the Salem Commercial club and Luther J. Chapin, chairman of the agricultural department of the club and W. C. Franklin were delegates from the local club. Assistant Club Manager C. E. Wilson accompanied the delegation from here. The next meeting of the federation will be held in a month at Jefferson.

Appraised by county educators and school patrons as one of the best school events staged in Marion county for many years, the county declamatory contest, in which winners from all district groups will participate, takes place at the Salem high school auditorium at 8 o'clock Saturday evening.

During the past two months preliminary tryouts and contests have been arranged and of the 100 or more pupils who entered, the nine on Saturday nights program are stars in their respective districts.

The contest is free to the public all being cordially invited to attend. The program includes special numbers from the Washington and Grant Junior high schools and the Lincoln elementary school. The event is under direction and arrangement of the Marion County Principals' association.

The report shows total assets of \$4,085,239.79 invested in bonds and deposited in banks against which there are liabilities represented by reserves set aside to meet deferred compensation payments, unclaimed warrants, etc. amounting to \$2,365,378.98.

Receipts of the department for the month of April totalled \$256,257.88 with disbursements of \$164,567.78.

The report shows a total of 1818 accidents for the month of which 13 were fatal.
