Oregon Agricultural college for the year 1897 was recently unearthed here and the first things start the finder in the face was a notice reading: "Board and room for young ladies, \$4 per week." At that time there were 126 students of whom about one-third were women. Now there are more than 1000 women in attendance here. The faculty at that time consisted of 100 members. There are now 148 professors and instructors.

## Canada Imposes New Restrictions In Liquor Selling

Victoria, B. C.—Patients in the habit of securing "sufficient" quantities of liquor under the British Columbia "prescription" system, will find their source of supply largely curtailed under the amended prohibition act, passed by the legislature March 19, and to which royal assent, making it effective, was given in the assembly a few days ago.

Under the amended act, physicians may only prescribe eight ounces of government dispensed liquor instead of two quarts as heretofore. If more is deemed necessary, the doctor must execute an affidavit that the liquor is for medicinal purposes only and that a thorough examination of the patient has been made. Liquor may be imported from without the province in accordance with federal statutes, but not be delivered to the home of the purchaser and may not be removed therefrom unless the owner is making a bona fide change of residence.

Prices of government dispensed liquor have increased about 20 per cent since the first of the year.

The "man in the woods" has an advantage over his city brother. Being far removed from the sources of supply, he may secure—through the prescription route—as much as two quarts. Anyone living more than five miles from a government dispensary or drug store may secure up to sixteen ounces.

**Fish Fertilizer Made.** Anchorage, Alaska—Among the new industries of Alaska and one that will recover large returns from hitherto waste are fish fertilizer factories which are being built by large canner plants. These plants are of modern type and will handle the byproducts of the canneries.

The Albany co-operative creamery manufactured 45,000 pounds of butter during April. This was 1000 pounds more than for April last year.
