Liberty Bonds Drop Lower
New York, May 19.—Stringent credit conditions provoked further extensive selling of liberty bonds and victory notes, mostly at new low rec-

ords, on the stock exchange today. By 12:30 o'clock, on sales approximating \$20,000,000 par value, new points of discount were established by liberty first and second 4's, the second and fourth 4 1/2's and victory 3 3/4's.

Economic Status Of Jugo-Slavia Reported Grave
Vienna, May 17.—Economic and political conditions in the western states of Jugo-Slavia are very grave, according to Dr. C. N. Leach, of San Francisco, and Major Philip Carrell, United States army, who have just returned from an extended automobile trip in those regions in connection with American relief work. They covered Croatia, Bosnia, Herzegovina, Southern Dalmatia, the vicinity of Spalato, the Dalmatian armistice zone and the Croatian coast.

2,000 Poles To Be Brought To U. S. Each Week
Warsaw, May 18.—Arrangements have been completed for the transportation of 2000 persons weekly from Poland to the United States by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid society of America, which recently opened offices in Warsaw. The Polish authorities estimate that a quarter of a million persons already have applied for passports, about 95 percent of these being women and children, dependants of persons now in America.

The first shipload of 800 emigrants left Danzig two weeks ago. Jacob Wassel of New York, chairman of the society's committee on work in foreign countries, estimates that the movement will continue for two years.

Turks Mass For Drive On Greeks
Constantinople, May 17.—Greek and Turkish troops have clashed about 25 miles east of Smyrna, where the Turks offensive and are apparently massing reinforcements preparatory to further advances against the Greeks.

French Troops All Withdrawn
Coblenz, May 17.—American authorities here were informed today from Mayence that all French troops which have been in Frankfurt and other centers in the Main district had returned to the Mayence bridgehead at 9:30 o'clock this morning. Mayo's of several of the smaller towns evacuated expressed appreciation of the attitude of the French upon withdrawing.
