

Johnson Apparent Choice of Oregon Republicans; All Amendments Except One Thought To Be Passed

Chamberlain Kozer Safe

Portland, Or., May 22.—In the democratic senatorial contest, Senator George E. Chamberlain was leading Harvey G. Starkweather by 1737 votes in a recapitulation made at 2 o'clock. This was from 19 counties incomplete, including Multnomah.

CHAMBERLAIN, STANFIELD AND KOZER LEAD MARION

Geo. E. Chamberlain was the 2 to 1 choice of Marion county democrats for nomination for the office of United States senator on the face of returns from 50 complete precincts in the county this afternoon. The vote stood Chamberlain 713, Starkweather 225. The returns indicate a majority of between 400 and 500 for Chamberlain in the county.

MARION GIVES MAJORITY FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

WITH 38 PRECINCTS IN With 38 precincts out of 74 in the county reported complete up to 1:30 o'clock this afternoon, the margin was for the support of the elementary schools in the state was leading by a safe margin, but its companion measure to give aid to the institutions of higher learning was behind.

The returns include only a few of the city and town precincts of the county, where the vote for both of the millage bills will be given a majority in the county when all of the returns have been tabulated. The blind school measure and the one restoring capital punishment in the state both carried in these precincts, as did the proposal to allow a 4 percent bonded indebtedness in the state for the construction of roads.

Wood Choice Of Voters of Polk County

Major General Leonard Wood is the choice of the republican voters of Polk county for president on the face of incomplete returns from 24 out of 47 precincts in that county at noon Saturday. Wood showed a total of 448 votes, Johnson 325, Hoover 171, Lowden 135.

The amendment providing an increase in the salary of the chief of police, or fixing at \$1500 a year, was in the lead with the following total votes in the seven precincts heard from: 739 yes, 273 no.

Carranza Is Officially Reported Killed; Died While Resisting Attack

Mexico City, May 22.—President Venustiano Carranza, who with a small party of followers has been a fugitive in the mountains of Puebla since late last week, was killed at Tlaxcalantongo early Thursday morning according to official announcement here. His companions, the names of whom are unknown also were killed.

General Rodolfo Herrera, it is said, directed the attack that resulted in the death of the fugitive president and his followers. He belonged to forces commanded by General Francisco Mariel, who accompanied Carranza in his flight from this city but who last week joined the revolutionists.

There is some uncertainty regarding the exact affiliation of General Herrera. It is generally believed possible, however, that he commanded a small group which was with the fleeing president. He was in rebellion against Carranza for several years, centering his operations in the state of Puebla. He surrendered last March to General Mariel, who was in command of government forces in that state.

When General Mariel went over to the revolutionists last week a portion of his troops, it is known, remained loyal to the president and belief exists that Carranza might have taken along with him in his flight toward Tuxpan, Herrera's forces, which finally turned against him. Tlaxcalantongo is a small village in the vicinity of Huauclilla in the northern "panhandle" of the state of Puebla. It is approximately 85 miles from San Andres, where Carranza left his force and took refuge in the mountains.

The official announcement was given out at 10:30 o'clock last night from the headquarters of General Obregon.

Companions Reported Safe

Mexico City, May 22.—Reports received here early this morning state that General Juan Barragan, chief of the presidential staff, Ygnacio Bonillas, former Mexican ambassador at Washington; General Marcelino Gonzales and General Frederico Montes, who accompanied President Carranza in his flight from San Andres, are safe. No mention is made of the others in the party which it is believed include Luis Cabrera, minister of the treasury, Alfonso Cabrera, his brother, governor of Puebla and General Francisco Murguia, who acted as commander of Carranza troops after the president had fled from this city.

Complete returns from seven out of the 18 precincts in the city of Salem at two o'clock this afternoon gave the following results:

In ward one, Leroy J. Simeral, with 293 votes from precincts 9 and 15 was leading Henry H. Vandervort for the four year term, who had 161 votes from both precincts.

While early this morning reports indicated that Evans was leading Race with a safe majority for city recorder, the figures changed with the reports from 9, 12, and 3, placing the present incumbent substantially in the lead.

Damaged Vessel Capsizes In Bay

Seattle, Wash., May 22.—The steam schooner Fred Baxter, which put into Port Townsend early this morning with a heavy list caused by contact with a tide rip off Marrowstone Point, Straits of Fuca, was reported to have capsized in Port Townsend harbor early today in comparatively shallow water.

The tug Monitor was reported to be standing by. The Baxter, operated by the Parr-McCormick Steamship Company between Puget Sound and San Francisco, was laden with a cargo of poles at the time of the mishap.

Draft Dodger Escapes Officers In Swift Auto

With 53 precincts out of 74 reported complete up to 2 o'clock on the republican presidential ballot, General Wood was leading by a margin of 104 votes in Marion county. The vote stood Wood 2256, Johnson 2146, Hoover 672, Lowden 367.

Portland, Or., May 22.—Returns compiled by the Portland Telegram at 2 o'clock today from 27 out of 35 counties in the state incomplete, including 144 complete precincts in Multnomah (Portland) county, give Senator Hiram W. Johnson a lead of 2208 over Major General Leonard Wood.

Presidential preference figures at 2 o'clock were as follows: Hoover 4041; Johnson 14,375; Lowden 4650; Wood 12,169.

Portland, Or., May 22.—Returns compiled from 17 counties in Oregon on yesterday's republican presidential preference primary give Hoover, 2348; Johnson 2295; Lowden 2011; Wood 7223. These figures include 86 precincts complete in Multnomah (Portland) county. More votes had been counted in these 17 counties than were tabulated earlier today in 29 counties.

Senator George E. Chamberlain has defeated Harvey G. Starkweather for the democratic nomination for United States senator. In the contest for the republican nomination for United States senator, R. N. Stanfield had a substantial majority over Albert Abraham.

Representative C. N. McArthur had a substantial lead over both his opponents in the race for the republican congressional nomination in the Third district.

Indications were that all of the constitutional amendments and measures on the ballot had carried, particularly those providing for educational betterments in the state. Only one measure, that referring to replacing capital punishment on the statute books seemed close, the proponents of the measure having a slight lead on the face of early returns.

For senator: Chamberlain 33; Starkweather. Sims Charges Turn Praise U. S. Navy

New York, May 22.—Rear Admiral William Sims, president of the naval war college, in his address at the graduation of this year's class today, said that barring a few cases, "our navy personnel not only responded to all requirements, but exceeded our most sanguine expectations in the endurance, zeal and loyal initiative they displayed" in the world war.

"This applies," he added, "not only to the forces in the war zone, but to the navy in general, and particularly to the very intelligent and skillful handling of the transport services in effective co-operation with the forces abroad."
