**Trucks Proposed For Transportation Of Perishable Food**

"Occasionally in traveling about the country, I meet some one who thinks that a truck is a farmer's luxury," says Dan Burns, local representative of the GMC. "But in general people are beginning to realize the importance of the part played by the commercial truck."


"According to an investigation just completed by congress, the people of the United States pay every year \$500,000,000 for the excessive cost of the transportation of food products. Think of it! \$500,000,000 that could be saved to the people. And this does not include the tremendous loss from the waste of perishable products. It is estimated that about 50 per cent of the perishable food produced annually in the United States is wasted through insufficient methods of transportation."

Women members of the club will also participate in a match playing 18 hole match, 18 holes on May 24, and 18 on May 30, for a prize offered by T. B. Kay.




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


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
