## Better Juvenile Court Plan Goal Of Rotary Club

Plans whereby a new form of juvenile court may be devised in Marion county, with a different and more efficient operating basis than the present method, was discussed at the meeting of the Salem Rotary club in Hotel Marion Wednesday noon. The committee on boys' work turned in a written report on their investigation, and recommended that members of the county court be invited to attend a future meeting of the club when the juvenile court plan may be discussed.

Tentative plans for this new method of dealing with boy incorrigibles call for the assignment of the boy to a responsible citizen who would devote some of his time to schooling the boy in the path of righteousness and citizenship.

**Portland Eating House Employes Demand Increase**

Portland, Or., May 26.—A new wage scale, covering increases of approximately 25 per cent, has been presented by the joint executive board of the cooks' union and of the waiters and waitresses' union to Portland caterers, to become effective June 1.

Unanimously the caterers have rejected the demands, which they declare impossible, and in return the caterers have demanded that the proposed schedule be withdrawn not later than June 1, declaring that if this is not done the entire catering system will go upon the "American plan in industry" which they say means that the union as such will not be recognized.

**Former Austrian Commander Dead**

Vienna, May 24.—Field Marshal Svetozar Boroevic, commander of Austrian forces on the Italian front from late in 1915 until October 1918 is dead. His death being caused by a stroke of apoplexy.

Field Marshal Boroevic was one of the enemy generals whose extradition on charges of violation of the laws of war was demanded by the allies last February.
