Independence, May 27.—The gasoline famine has probably hit Independence as hard as any town in the state. The only place where people could be supplied this week was at the Sayles Motor Co., and here only in limited amounts. People have been here from Albany and Dallas during the week trying to get gas. Mr. Sayles of the Sayles Motor Co., is in Portland trying to replenish the supply. The Standard Oil Co. tanks have been empty for some time. Not a gallon of gasoline was to be had in the city last evening and joy riding has been prohibited. The ferry boat has been hindered on account of the shortage and makes trips only as the boat is filled. Some gas has been obtained from Salem during the week and many cars have been driven there to have the tanks filled.

The Ellison-White Chautauqua Co. erected the tent here yesterday and the independence chautauqua is attracting considerable attention.

Dallas 500 Club Is Entertained

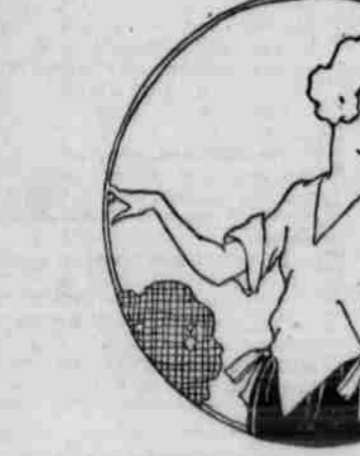

Two Pioneers Of Oregon Pass On During Past Week

Hubbard, Or., May 27.—In the past week two of the old pioneers of Oregon have gone to their reward and were laid to rest in the historic spots of the state.

William Vietheer, the first of the two mentioned, was born in Germany, 77 years ago and came to the United States as early in his boyhood as possible, coming to the northwest arid Oregon when the state began its historic struggle in land clearing and up to twenty years ago was actively engaged in this community life. Death occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Julia Miller at Milwaukee, May 19, and burial at Champeeg, May 22. Deceased is survived by three daughters and three sons.

William L. Hinkle, who came to Oregon in '52, died in Portland, Sunday evening, May 23, at the age of 83 and was laid to rest at The Dalles Wednesday afternoon. Deceased was one of three brothers who were identified with the development of this section of Oregon when the thoroughfares of today were known as paths through the timber. For a number of years he was located at Astoria in eastern Oregon. John H. Hinkle of Salem is the surviving brother.
