

Freight Ships to Operate Between Coast and Europe

San Francisco, May 27.—Four huge freighters will soon conduct regular service between Rotterdam and San Francisco and other ports on the west coast, by way of the Panama canal. It was announced here by the Pan-American line.

The Java-Pacific line, plying freight passenger vessels between Batavia, San Francisco, will shortly place additional ships on this run, it was announced by the company.

Reclamation Men Will Accept Act For Partial Relief

Not accomplishing the purpose of the Western States Reclamation Association, Senator William H. Burton, of Oregon, will accept the act, which will at least be accepted by the association as an entering wedge in the reclamation and development of lands in western states, according to Percy A. Cooper, state director.

Mr. Burton explains, in a letter to the association, that the act is a land settlement measure, and that the general powers given the reclamation department will be used in carrying out the purpose of the act to undertake irrigation and other development projects. It seeks to provide for the construction of levees and other structures and to provide for the settlement of men and women on the lands.

It will not be practical under this act to concentrate sufficient funds on any one project to warrant the reclamation of our large, extensive irrigation projects and it will be necessary to confine attention to the smaller projects. Mr. Cooper explains, "However, it is not unlikely that some measure of this character will receive the favorable attention of congress and will accomplish in part what the Western States Reclamation Association desires in that it will stimulate reclamation and make provision for service men."

Johnson To Tell Working Of New Real Estate Law

Real estate dealers who assemble at the national convention at Kansas City this week will be told how "dealers" are regulated in Oregon under the act of the 1919 legislature requiring a license and bond for all real estate brokers.

C. V. Johnson, manager of the real estate brokers' department of the state insurance commission, will tell the delegates Wednesday morning where he will join the delegates from other states in the northwestern states bound for the big convention, as much as Oregon is the only one in the northwest which regulates real estate brokers.

Johnson has placed on the program for a report on the operation of the law in the state. The party will stop over in the way to Kansas City.

The filing fee which a candidate pays for the privilege of entering the primary race in Oregon is not included in the expense items to be included in the financial statement filed by candidates with the secretary of state or county clerk. This is the opinion of an opinion prepared Wednesday by Attorney General Brown in reply to an inquiry from E. G. Tongue, district attorney for Wasco county.

Women Urged To Save Sugar By Boycotting Candy

Seattle, Wash., May 27.—Miss Edith T. Strauss, Washington, D. C. director of women's activities in reducing the high cost of living, has wired the Seattle office of the department of justice pleading that the women of this state be urged to curtail the use of non-essentials in the manufacture of which sugar is used. Her message says twenty per cent of the sugar manufactured goes into non-essentials, such as candy, soft drinks and gum, the per capita consumption of which is higher in the United States than in any other country. Speedy curtailment is imperative to provide sugar for eating and preserving purposes.

Red Cross Aids Service Men In Getting All Due

As an aid to ex-service men who have not received all the benefits to which they are entitled, a questionnaire has been prepared by the Red Cross. By filling this out ex-soldiers and sailors are enabled to place their claims definitely before the government and receive the benefits allowed them. As only a short time remains in which to present claims it is suggested that they make use of the opportunity at once and send in a filled questionnaire to the local branch of the Red Cross at the post office, of which Mrs. Alice H. Dudd is secretary. The questionnaire in full is:

1. Mileage—(a) Did you receive a mile when discharged?

(b) Were you paid to your home at time of discharge?

2. Bounties—Did you receive the \$30 bonus?

3. Check pay—(a) Did you get the money due you on discharge?

(b) Were all allotments and allowances made by you received by the allottee?

(c) Did you receive your clothing allowance?

(d) Service pay?

(e) All liberty bonds?

4. Insurance—(a) Has it lapsed?

(b) Is it converted?

5. Compensation—(a) Are you now suffering from the effects of disease or injury received while in the service?

(b) Is your claim filed?

(c) Has an award been made?

(d) Are you receiving the checks regularly?

(e) Are you in need of medical treatment?

(f) Are you receiving medical treatment?

6. Vocational training—(a) Are you vocationally handicapped?

(b) Have you applied for training?

(c) Has it been approved?

7. Employment—(a) Are you permanently employed?

(b) Are you doing the work you are fitted for?

8. Are you of the opinion that you have something due from the government? If so, for what reason?

9. Do you know any service men entitled to government aid who is not getting it? If so, give name and address.

Texas Democrats Send Delegates Uninstructed

Dallas, Texas, May 26.—Texas democratic politics which for months had been at boiling point over questions of endorsement or repudiation of the administration of President Wilson, cooled today to state questions with the closing of the state democratic convention, which unanimously approved the actions of the Wilson administration.

Thirty-six delegates with one vote each, including three women and sixteen delegates at large with one-fourth vote each and of whom four are women, were elected to represent Texas at San Francisco, June 28. These forty votes go uninstructed. William G. Mc-
