Otto was sentenced from San Francisco for burglary.

J. Juljada and George Clifford made the dash with Otto but were at once

captured by guards. Otto gained the underbrush under fire of guards from the prison walls, but was seen to stumble just before he disappeared from view. In 1917 Otto escaped from San Quentin prison.
