

### Schulderman's Candidacy for Office Cost \$370

Henry J. Schulderman, deposited state corporation commissioner, is out of pocket the sum total of \$370.59 in his campaign for the republican nomination as a candidate for secretary of state for Oregon, according to his financial statement filed with the secretary of state's office this morning. This figure, it is believed, does not include several hundred dollars which must have been contributed toward Schulderman's campaign fund by friends who were interested in his success in the primaries as evidenced by the heavy advertising campaign conducted in behalf of Schulderman's candidacy.

### Reason for "Gas" Shortage Is Not Likely Personel of Segislature for Next Term Told

The real reason for the shortage of gasoline in Salem, and throughout the Willamette valley generally, seemed lacking in opinion of oil men and others here Monday. Numerous opinions have been advanced for the cause of the shortage, with no one apparently knowing the real cause of the shortage.

The Standard Oil company representatives here said Monday that they had just received another carload of gasoline of 20,000 gallons. This, they said, would be sold pursuant to the ration plan, preference being given to commercial cars. Pleasure drivers will be given a little gasoline as possible until relief from the shortage is seen. The Standard Oil agency here reports that they had no assurance of receiving more gasoline.

### Corey Advises More Interest In Fight Against Rate Shift

H. Corey, public service commissioner from the eastern Oregon district.
