Palmer Replies To Accusation of Bonniwell

Washington, June 2.—Attorney General Palmer appeared in the senate campaign investigating committee room today just before the afternoon session of the committee began. He was the first of the presidential nomination candidates whose campaigns are under investigation who has appeared at the inquiry.

Mr. Palmer replied briefly to statements made by Mr. Bonniwell saying he did so only because his "good name is more to me than any office on earth." Had the statement been made in Pennsylvania by the witness, he said, he "would not have replied because in Pennsylvania Judge Bonniwell's word is not evidence of the fact."

Senator Reed interrupted to ask that Mr. Palmer refrain from "personalities." The committee then decided that Mr. Palmer's statement should be made under oath and he was sworn.

The attorney general said that "Judge Bonniwell" had dealt in "character assassination" in Pennsylvania for years and that his statements would not be dignified by a denial had they been made anywhere but to a senate committee.

Second Concert Of Salem High Students Friday

Large Reward Is Offered By State For Dynamiters

Reports that unknown persons have been engaged in extensive fish dynamiting on the Satiam river between Green's bridge and West Stayton has caused a reward of \$200 to be posted. This amount will be paid by the state fish and game commission for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the "dynamiters."

District Warden Roy Bremmer has received notice of the offer and asks that his Salem office be given the full co-operation of every true sportsman in the effort to locate the person or persons guilty of the outrage. Warden Bremmer is authorized to receive this information and states that anyone giving the reliable aid desired is entitled to the reward.

In addition to other sources, Salem fishermen have reported that large numbers of dead trout and salmon have been found recently in the Santiam.

Governor Sproul To Be Advanced For Nomination

Philadelphia, June 2.—Governor William C. Sproul at a caucus of Pennsylvania national delegates today announced his name would be presented to the republican convention as a candidate for president, but was opposed to the delegation taking any formal action as a unit.

The governor said: "My name will be presented to the convention, and I should much rather have the support of our delegates, as determined by their own individual convictions, than as representative of any caucus action or unit rule."

Honor Hopewell Boy Who Fell In Flanders

The United Brethren and Seventh Day Adventist churches of Hopewell and the Methodist and Evangelical churches of Aumsville, held union services Sunday afternoon in paying tribute to the memory of William Manley Bower of Hopewell.

While serving with the American expeditionary forces in France, William Manley Bower died in action near the Belgian frontier. No previous services having been held at Aumsville in honor of the deceased soldier, Sunday's observances were held. Many persons from various sections of the county were present.

Convict Caught In Douglas County

Sam Pauff, erstwhile nihilist, who escaped from the state prison here just

before noon Saturday was captured at Glendale, Douglas county, last night, according to information received by prison officials. A guard from the prison left last night and will return with Pauff today. Pauff was sentenced to serve a term of not to exceed ten years on a charge of assault with intent to rob in Multnomah county, being received here February 19, last. He made his escape from the prison Saturday by sliding out of the prison yard underneath a motor truck.

Wall Street Pays Big Internal Tax

New York.—The government receives more than \$30,000,000 annually in revenue from brokers' licenses and stock transactions in New York, says William H. Edwards, collector of internal revenue for this district. Six thousand stock brokers, he said, pay a license tax of \$50 and in addition a special tax of \$100 or \$150 according to the salable value of their seats on local exchanges.

Of the 4,000 commission brokers, those who are members of an exchange where produce of other wares are traded in pay a yearly tax of \$50. A two cent tax on shares traded in on the stock exchange nets the government several thousand dollars daily. Unlisted corporations having a home office in the United States are subject to the original issue tax of 5 cents a share on all stocks valued at \$100 or fraction thereof.

The monthly sale of documentary stamps averages \$2,000,000 more than half of which is in stamps of \$1,000 denomination or approximately 1,500 \$1,000 stamp sales for stock transactions, Mr. Edwards said. To supply the demand a reserve supply of stamps valued at \$10,000,000 always is maintained in the Custom House vaults.

Driscoll Named On Commission In Stones' Place

The resignation of C. F. Stone of Klamath Falls as a member of the state fish and game commission and the appointment of James H. Driscoll of Klamath Falls as his successor was made public by Governor Oicott this afternoon. Stone gives lack of time to devote to the duties of the office as the reason for his resignation.

Driscoll was a deputy game warden in Klamath and Jackson counties for several years and was later employed as a bookkeeper in the Portland office of the commission. He was at one time county clerk of Klamath county.
