### Water Permits

Application for permission to construct a reservoir for the storage of 200 acre feet of water and for permission to appropriate the stored water for the irrigation of 160 acres of land in Malheur county, has been filed with the state engineer's office here by Clarence S. Miller of Catlow, Or.

Other applications for water rights have been filed as follows:

By A. E. Routh of Enterprise, covering the appropriation of water from Hurricane creek for the irrigation of 32 acres in Walla Walla county.

By A. E. Hall of Feewater, covering the appropriation of water from the east branch of Little Walls Valley for the irrigation of a small tract in Umatilla county.

By L. C. Masters of Fangallano, Or., covering the appropriation of water from Willow Springs in Malheur county for domestic purposes.

By Rufus M. Dimick of Jordan valley, covering the construction of a small reservoir and the appropriation of stored water for stock purposes.

### Candidates Who Are Defeated In Primary Are Out

A defeated candidate for nomination for political office in Oregon can neither accept the nomination of another party nor run as an independent candidate, according to an opinion prepared by Attorney General Brown. This interpretation of the law by the attorney general is based upon the 1919 amendment to a previous law. Prior to this time it has been possible for defeated candidates to become independent candidates, it is explained, but this is prohibited under the new law. Several inquiries as to the status of candidates who have been defeated for nomination have been received by the secretary of state's office since the primary result became known.

### Delaware Solons Adjourn Without Passing Suffrage

Dover, Del., June 2.—The Delaware legislature adjourned sine die at 3:30 p. m. today without ratifying the Susan B. Anthony federal suffrage amendment. There was a test vote shortly before adjournment when Representative Lyons majority floor leader, attempted to force the house into committee of the whole to consider the suffrage ratification resolution. Mr. Lyons motion was lost by 24 votes to 10.

Governor Olcott has signed requisition papers for the return to Oregon of E. J. Clark, under arrest at Los Angeles on the charge of forgery committed at Portland.

### Oregon Power To Be Developed Is Expectation Now

The enactment of the federal water power bill which was approved by congress last week, is expected to result in a pronounced activity in power development in Oregon whose streams are able to provide approximately one-tenth of the entire available hydro-electric power in the United States, according to State Engineer Percy A. Cupper.

Development of the water power of the country has been practically at a standstill for many years past because of the uncertainty as to what federal restrictions would surround the development of this resource, Cupper declares.

According to figures prepared by the director of the United States geological survey there are a minimum of 30,000,000 hydro-electric horsepower in the United States, less than one-third of which is now being utilized. Of the available power 70 per cent is west of the Mississippi river although of the developed power 70 per cent is east of the Mississippi.

It is estimated that between 3,000,000 and 4,000,000 horsepower can be developed in Oregon alone, with a total of approximately 165,000 horsepower actually utilized at the present time.

The state highway commission has decided to build a new bridge across the Willamette at Harrisburg. The cost will be borne by Lane and Linn counties.
