Claim of City Of Portland for Money Is Denied

The controversy between the city of Portland and the state board of health over the payment of claims incident to the maintenance of The Cedars, Portland's venerable isolation hospital, took a new and wholly unexpected turn Friday when the state board of health not only refused to ask for a deficiency appropriation for the purpose of reimbursing the city of Portland for its claim against the state, but disputed the legitimacy of these claims.

This reversal of the position of the state board of health which had heretofore approved the claims of the city and expressed its readiness to cooperate with the city in securing the payment of these claims aggregating more than \$11,000 was occasioned by an investigation of the city's claims by H. F. McInturf, Portland attorney, the result of which was first made known to the members of the board of health while enroute to the emergency board session here this morning.

Much heated argument featured this morning's session, the emergency board all the while protesting its inability to act in the matter. Commissioner John Mann and C. A. Bigelow representing the city of Portland, estimated bad faith on the part of the state board of health when Dr. David M. Koberg, secretary of the board, threw his bomb into the session by questioning the justness of Portland's claims and flatly refusing to ask for state aid in payment of the same.
