# New Deaconess Hospital to be Ready by Fall

According to present plans, the new Deaconess hospital will be ready for occupancy by fall. The building will be a three story structure of brick, and will have a full basement. It is 36 by 120 feet, and will cost when equipped, about \$50,000.

The Salem Deaconess hospital was opened on December 3, 1916, with three nurses. F. B. Wedel has been president of the board of directors since its foundation, and Sister Marie, daughter of Mr. Wedel, has been head deaconess. There are now from 12 to 15 nurses, five of whom are student nurses in its enlarged capacity, when the new building is completed, the training school for nurses will accommodate larger classes.

A home for nurses will be erected later, and a Mennonite church building is planned for the future. The hospital is under the auspices of the Mennonite church of Oregon and is the only hospital of that denomination on the Pacific coast.


Marc L. Latham of Silverton, a student at the university, spent the week end visiting friends in Salem. He is a graduate of the local high school.
