

Republicans to Start Campaign Without Delay

Chicago, June 15.—The republican campaign for the election of Senator Warren G. Harding to the presidency was launched today at national committee headquarters here. While Chairman Will H. Hays conferred with Captain Victor Heintz, regional director, and other leaders, the committee moved from the coliseum back to its campaign headquarters in a downtown hotel and cleared desks of convention matters in preparation for the coming drive.

The first lot of 5,000,000 lithographs of the candidate will be ready for distribution this week. Chairman Hays announced. The paper was purchased and cut several months ago and pictures and autographs of all the candidates obtained. By a strange coincidence the printer who won the contract chose Senator Harding's picture to demonstrate his work.

Injured Workmen Given Financial Aid In Four Days

A study just completed by the state industrial accident commission shows that claims for workmen's compensation are now paid within an average of 4.1 days after the same have been filed. More than half of the claims are paid within two days after being filed. The study also shows that employers reports on accident are filed in an average of 12 days, the workmen's report in an average of 15.3 days and the physician's report in an average of 9 days. The study shows a marked improvement in the handling of claims by the department over the figures resulting from a similar study conducted last December.
