Union Company Reports Heavy Gasoline Sales

The near monopoly which the Union Oil company of California has been enjoying in the sale of gasoline in the several towns in Oregon in which it maintains distributing stations, during the month of May over the sales of the previous month as reported to Secretary of State Koser in connection with the remittance of state taxes on motor fuel oil sales. Sales for May, the report shows totaled \$57,672.75 gallons of gasoline, a gain of approximately 30 per cent over the 411,936 gallons sold by this company in Oregon during April. Distillate sales for May, totaling \$6,349, also show a very material gain over the sales for April when the sales of this fuel oil by the Union company totaled only 45,678 gallons. A check for \$6368.47 accompanied the May report to cover the state tax on fuel oil sales.

State Control Of Gasoline Supply Urged 'As Legal'

A formal complaint to test out the jurisdiction of the Oregon public service commission over the distribution of gasoline in this state will probably be filed by the Portland Garage & Repair Men's association within a few days, according to a letter received by the commission this morning from Will J. Lester, secretary of the association.
 As a transportation commodity and of vital importance to the maintenance of transportation in the state the distribution of gasoline should come within the jurisdiction of the state regulatory body, the letter declares, adding that able legal talent in Portland has declared that there are ample laws on the statute books to confer all the power necessary for the assumption of this jurisdiction.
 The commission has heretofore maintained that it possessed no jurisdiction over the sale or distribution of gasoline but the matter will be placed before Attorney General Brown for an opinion at this time.

Tramp Killed In Wreck; Body Is Found Burned

Ellensburg, Wash., June 17.—The death list resulting from the wreck of a runaway freight train on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad between Boylston tunnel and Beverly, Wednesday morning, which 48 loaded freight cars were burned and ten wrecked, was increased to two today when the charred remains of a man were recovered from the debris of ten cars dished and burned near Rozzie siding. The body is believed by railroad officials to be that of a tramp who was stealing a ride, as all members of the train crew have been accounted for.
