### Associated-United Oil Company's Gas Sales Are Heavy

A total of 689,954 gallons of gasoline and 21,421 gallons of distillate were sold in Oregon by the Associated Oil company of California during May, according to the monthly report of the company filed with the secretary of state's office, Thursday. Accompanying the report was a check for \$7655 in payment of the state tax on motor fuel oil sales.

The report of the Shell company, also filed Thursday, shows total sales for May aggregating 212,629 gallons of gasoline and 2174 gallons of distillate. The state tax amount to \$2137.37.

### Commission Cannot Regulate Price of Gasoline -- Brown

Without additional legislation to that end the Oregon public service commission is powerless to regulate the price or distribution of gasoline, according to Attorney General Brown, who in an opinion rendered today holds that the public utility within the meaning of the public utility act as it now stands. The opinion was written in response to an inquiry from the commission as to its jurisdiction in the present gasoline emergency.

"You have no more power as a commission to regulate the price of gasoline than you have to regulate the price or distribution of wood or coal," the opinion reads. "You have no power to fix the distribution or allotment to the public, nor to regulate the price or distribution of coal to the public utilities of Oregon, nor have you any more or greater authority or power to distribute or make the rules for the distribution of gasoline."

"We cannot enlarge the meaning of the law by construction or by interpretation for the purpose of meeting the situation as it exists today. The situation may present a proper matter for legislation but not a fit subject for the enforcement of the public utility law as it now exists. Until a law exists there can be no enforcement thereof."

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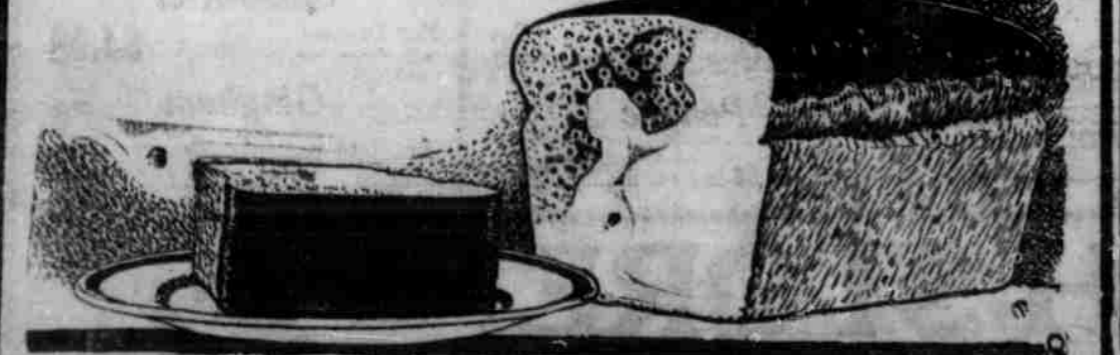
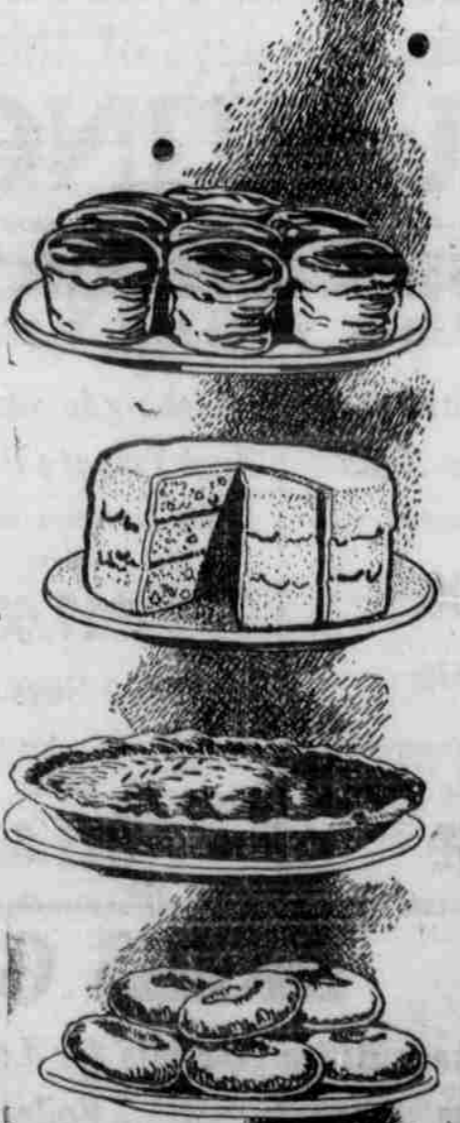
