

# Marion County Industries

Silverton Lumber Company  
Silver Falls Timber Co.

Silverton is justly laying claim to the last word in lumber manufacturing, and what the two enterprises have done in the way of developing the city and tributary country can best be estimated by looking backward to the Silverton of fifteen years ago. Prior to 1905 the population of the city was less than 1000. When the Silverton Lumber company established its mill in Silverton that year the population almost doubled within a period of 12 months. With the increasing population came new enterprises, better schools, better churches and better churches. And the enterprise was the foundation of a prosperous community. It lifted the city out of the rut it had been in for a decade and made a great city out of a mere village of fifty years' existence. But in this half has not been told.

March 12, 1917, the large electrical-driven mill of the Silver Falls Timber company was completed and has been cutting lumber at the rate of \$25,000 to \$26,000 per day since its establishment. This enterprise gave the city another push forward and to the city another, according to popular estimate, is more than \$900. The industrialists of this great concern were Jacob Mortenson of Oak Park, Ill., president; C. E. Latimer of Chicago, treasurer; L. B. Menefee, of Portland, vice-president; and M. C. Woodard, of Silverton, secretary and general manager. The company owns a large acreage of timber lands in Marion and Clackamas counties thirty miles south-east of the city, and this body of timber is connected with the plant at Silverton by a logging road and is operated by the firm. The logging camps and railway equipment are sufficient to transport approximately 100,000,000 feet of logs a year. The company owns about one hundred forty acres of land about the city of Silverton and adjoining the city. The logged-off lands are being made into farms and fruit orchards.

In March, 1916, the company broke ground for the construction of the mill, which is modern in every respect, and in less than twelve months it was put in operation with a crew of five hundred men. The pay rolls of Silverton's two lumbering enterprises aggregate more than \$100,000 per month. The mill was designed by M. C. Woodard in co-operation of the Portland branch of the Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company. The mill site occupies 140 acres adjacent to Silverton, and the J. Wolfard farm has been converted into a city which is known as the North Side addition. While this is not in the city proper, it is connected with the city by means of a hard surface road and is provided with all the requisites and conveniences of the city.

Perhaps the most striking feature of the mill is the splendid isolation of the various plant units from each other, affording most unlimited room for expansion and at the same time materially reducing the fire hazard. Entering the mill from the headend, the visitor looks out upon an artificial log pond of more than twelve acres, which has a storage capacity of 12,000,000 feet of logs. Water for the pond is provided by means of a gravity water system with intake on the Abiqua river several miles above Silverton. This was built by the Silver Falls Timber company for the city, at a cost much less than the former system was constructed.
