Among the recent graduates of Salem senior high school, well known here, were Mae Hall, Mattie Edith Farman, Olive Kiser and Norma Elvay Webb.

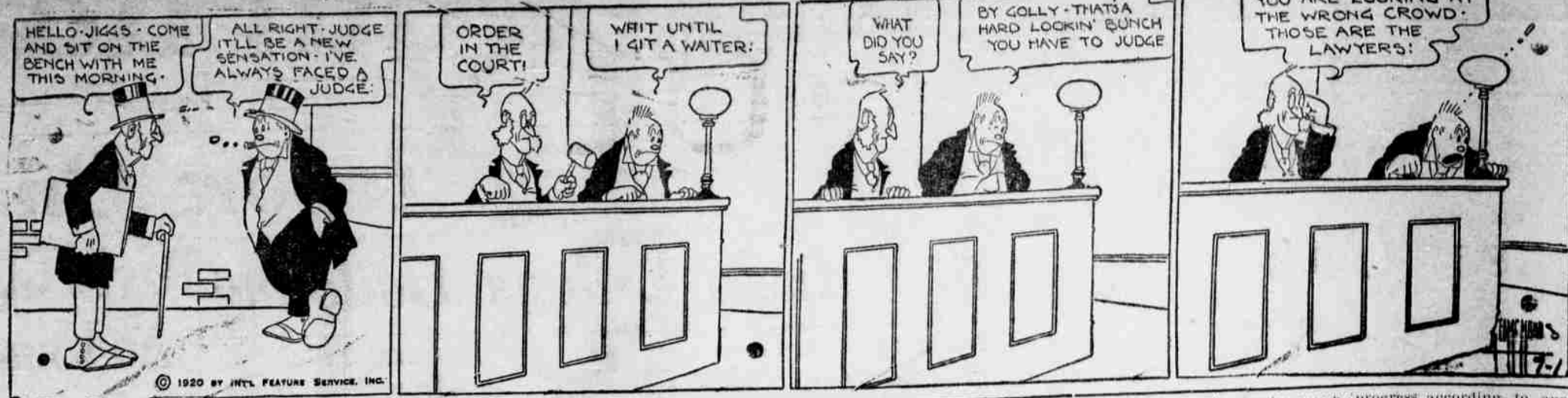
Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Westley of Astoria are the parents of a son.

Dallas, July 1.—The industries of Dallas are proving to be so numerous and valuable that capital is seeking an anchorage here. Many new enterprises have begun recently among them, one of the best equipped locomotive and iron works that can be found in the Willamette valley. A new process fruit drier, a cannery and now another saw mill is being planned. Ed Hamilton, a veteran of the war with the rank of captain in the spruce division and formerly associated with the Monmouth Lumber Co., is moving his mill from the Smith farm near Bridgeport where he has been operating the past year. The mill will be located on the Spaulding site on North Levens street. They will begin operating with a 25,000 capacity and increase the output in due course of time. He has contracted for 3,000,000 feet of timber near Salt Creek. The mill is to be located near the LaCroche creek and a dam will be made to hold the logs.

Auto Goes Over Grade

An auto accident unprecedented in the history of the gas wagon occurred in the Butler district recently.
