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Polk Farmers Not Afraid of Labor Shortage

Independence, Or., July 6.—The labor supply will not be a matter of serious concern to Polk county farmers this year, according to the prediction of husbandmen in this vicinity. The harvest season is now beginning in Eastern Oregon, it is said, and it is believed that it will be concluded in time for a large number of laborers to come to the Willamette valley. Good wages are offered by the farmers of Polk county and help will be abundant. The first cutting of hay is being cared for by the labor available now without difficulty. An adequate labor supply will mean a saving to the farmers inasmuch as they will not be compelled by necessity to bid against others for laborers. The hop growers of Independence are also well pleased over the labor situation. Every yard has a full crew, and it is said that many pickers have already spoken for a situation in the big yards during the entire harvest. At the Horst Bros. yard, comprising more than four hundred acres, a vast army of laborers are now busy cultivating and the place appears more like a city than a farm. The crop is said to be one of the best ever known in the history of that yard.

Salem-Dallas Road Opened to Brunk's Corner

Independence, Or., July 6.—The Salem-Dallas road was opened yesterday between Brunk's corner and Salem for the first time since the paving started. The hard surface has been laid all the way from Salem to the water tank and most of the way to the corner. There are two short strips to be finished and within a week or ten days, it is said, the work will be completed all the way to the Independence road. When this is finished work will start between Brunk's farm and Hickman. The road will be completed, it is said, all the way to Dallas this summer. Fire started on the west side of the road near McNary yesterday afternoon and did some little damage to fence posts, telephone poles and grain in the adjacent field. The fire is supposed to have originated from a fire cracker thrown from some passing car. It spread for several rods before it was discovered and extinguished. W. H. Paving Work On Mt. Angel Road Commenced Today

Mt. Angel, Or., July 6.—The paving plant which has been idle here since its erection some time ago waiting the action of the county court, commenced work this morning and paving is in operation on the road north of the city. Now that the bankers of Marion county have made arrangements to handle the bonds the paving, it is said, will proceed in different parts of the county. The work will be completed to a point on the Woodburn road two miles north of Mt. Angel, then east on the Scotts Mills road, and then south on the Silverton road to the Abiqua river bridge. It is understood, also, that the Silverton-Salem road will be paved from the city limits of Silverton to the Pudding river bridge.

Tourist Travel Shows Increase

Independence, Or., July 6.—A noticeable increase in the number of tourists passing through the city has been seen during the past few days. They come in cars of every description and equipped with every sort of device for camping, while many of them stop at the hotel and with friends or relatives on the way. A camping park on the east side of the river has been used by large numbers, and it is said that ten different parties pitched their tents one evening last week. The city is in real need of a public camping ground for the travelers, one provided with pure water and better accommodations than nature has provided all along the river road.

Twilight Union Services Planned

Silverton, Or., July 6.—It is said that a series of twilight Sunday evening union church services will likely be one of the attractions in Silverton during the summer. If the proposition spoken of by some of the members of the churches reaches full development, beginning at 7 o'clock the meetings will be held in the park and will combine the regular sacred songs preceding the sermon. It is also believed that a band or orchestra may be secured for the occasions.

A short address will be given each Sunday evening and singing of familiar hymns will be led by a choir composed of singers from the different congregations in the city, or by the orchestra if such is secured. This proposed system is something new in Silverton and members of the churches interested are in hopes to increase the attendance at Sunday evening services. Open air meetings have been conducted in Silverton from time to time, but they have not included the concerts, and have also commenced at 8 o'clock, making it necessary to use artificial lighting for the meetings. The purpose, it is said, is to make the meetings of this summer informal and as restful as possible.

If the plans can be consummated each of the ministers in the city speak. If, however, speakers of unusual talent from out of Silverton are here, they will, of course, be given the opportunity to speak. The program evening will begin with several sacred songs. Plans have not yet been definitely made for this series of meetings, but it is believed that the proposition will appeal to most of the ministers and church members.
