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Governor And Chapman Speak At Celebration

Hopewell July 7.—Governor Ben W. Olcott and C. C. Chapman, editor of the Oregon Voter, were the speakers of the day at Hopewell's independence day celebration staged in Chapman's grove Monday. The celebration was an old fashioned community picnic and every one came with well filled baskets of good things to eat which were spread about in the shade of the trees at the noon hour.

The morning hours were devoted to a patriotic program of songs and recitations and a children's drill that did great credit to those in charge of the program. C. C. Chapman concluded the morning program with a brief but intensely patriotic address in which he called attention to the hardships braved by the pioneers in carving out the Oregon empire from the wilderness of the northwest and urged the present generation to uphold the traditions of those who had blazed the way.

Foot races for old and young, boys and girls and all who cared to enter with a sack race and a greased pole climbing contest occupied the time of the early afternoon. Governor and Mrs. Olcott, State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle and Mrs. Lytle and Carl Gabrielson, head of the state automobile department dropped in on the picnickers during the afternoon and the governor was prevailed upon to address the assemblage which he did, expressing his appreciation of the community spirit which made such a gathering possible.

A baseball game between the married men and the single men was won by the latter by a score of 14 to 4. Governor Olcott pitched the first ball with Editor Chapman on the receiving end of the battery.

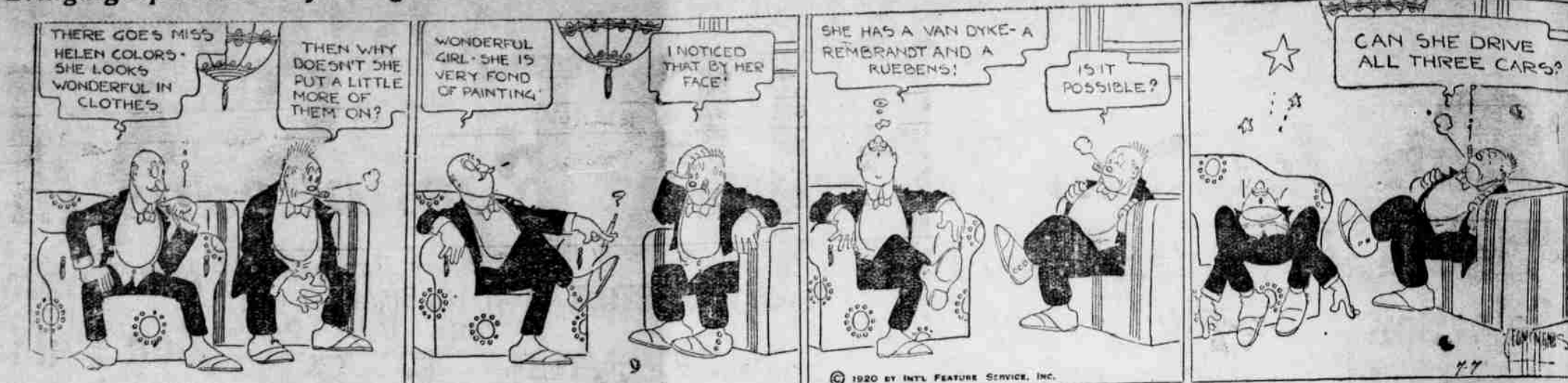
