## Today's Dallas News

Dallas, July 13.—The fire at the Willamette Valley Lumber company's mill is still burning but only the heavy timbers and the foundation of the mill remain to burn out. There is little danger of the fire spreading at this time. Crews of men are on the watch day and night and it will only be a few days until these crews can be dispersed with. The estimated loss of three hundred thousand dollars has been reduced since the invoice has been taken of materials which were destroyed by the fire, to a total loss of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. The plant was fairly well covered by insurance and the work of rebuilding will begin according to authentic reports as soon as the insurance is adjusted and the burning embers permit. Only a few trucks which were used for transferring lumber about the yard and a few thousand feet of lumber were lost. The boilers of the mill were not materially damaged and cannot be considered a loss. Most of all the mill hands will be employed in reconstruction and, at the present time, in cleaning up the debris. The logging operations in the logging camps from where the mill got its supply of logs will not be discontinued but kept operating at full capacity. The light plant, which is adjoining the mill, depends upon the fuel from the mill to furnish heat for propelling their plant. This at first seemed to be a big question confronting the light and power company but the partially burned timbers are being used to supply fuel for the light plant and will undoubtedly be sufficient to last until the new mill can begin operating. There is, however, a possibility of many of the homes in Dallas being seriously affected as a good many of them depended upon the mill for their wood supply. No doubt the price of cord wood in and around Dallas will increase, due to shortage and demand. The labor situation not being affected materially and the fire having been checked before the entire plant was destroyed causes the people in this vicinity to feel somewhat gratified, though indeed sorry that such a misfortune came to the city and particularly to the lumber company.

Dallas chautauqua began last night with a large attendance. The local chautauqua association reported that they had sold in the neighborhood of \$2000 worth of tickets which is about 200 above their guarantee.

Aurora, Or., July 13.—The house on the Lew Prahl farm near here, which was occupied by Mrs. McInness, was consumed by fire early Wednesday morning, together with most of the contents. The origin of the fire is unknown. The alarm was given through the Aurora telephone office and many citizens along the line rushed to the scene of the conflagration, but were unable to render much assistance. The entire upper part of the house was enveloped in flames before the fire was discovered, and although many people responded to the call, little assistance could be rendered.

The property is said to have been a total loss, as there was no insurance on the house or furniture.

Little hope is entertained for the recovery of Charles Zimmerman, 82 years of age, who was injured a few days ago by a fall from a cherry tree in his yard. Mr. Zimmerman is confined in a hospital in Portland and late reports are to the effect that he is not recovering as rapidly as was hoped he might. Mexico Planning International Road  
Nogales, Ariz.—A great national highway has been ordered constructed by the new Mexican federal government to extend from Sonoma, Sonora, on the international line, along that line to Juarez, opposite El Paso, Texas, and from that point proceed on down the central tableland of Mexico into the City of Mexico. The contemplated highway when completed will be of about 2,000 miles.

A projected road from Tucson, Ariz., to Port Lobos on the Gulf of California crosses from this state into Sonora, Mexico, at Sonoma, where the new Mexican national highway starts. Thus, according to plans, the highway from the Mexican capital will connect with the great state road system of Arizona and through that with the fine system of roadways in California.

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
