Stayton, Sept. 8.—The Stayton Light and Power company has purchased the Mrs. Anna Brown property at the end of Third street, and is tearing down the old building. A new water wheel has been purchased and will be placed on the newly acquired property on the south side of the water ditch. The wheel is a big one, weighing over five tons, and capable of developing 200 horsepower when set in its new location. A dynamo will be placed on the south side of the ditch also, and when the work in process of construction is completed the company will have two separate plants. The office building now in use will probably be moved onto the lot on which the building now being demolished stands.

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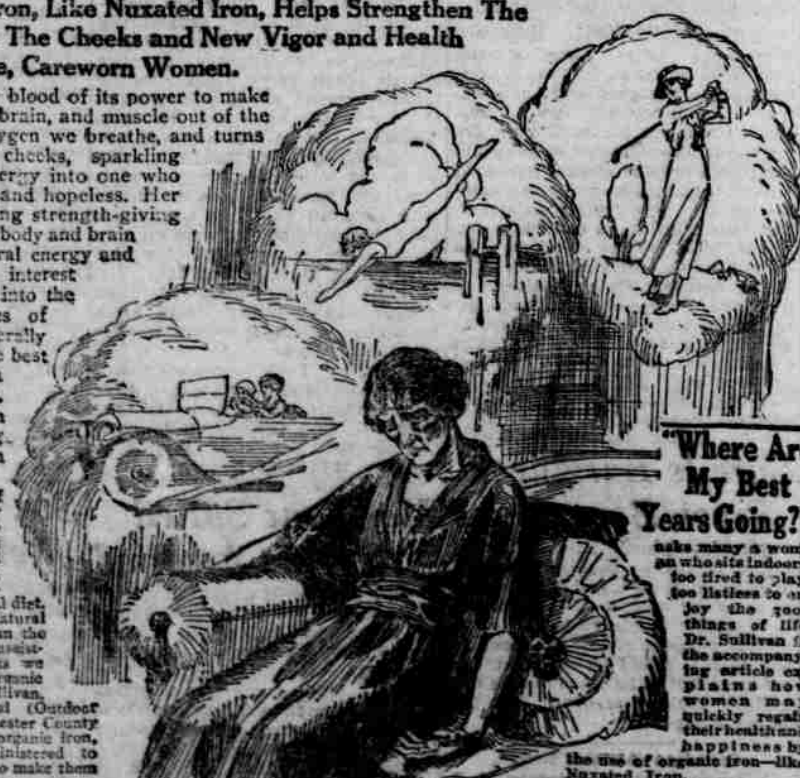
