

Action For Divorce Against Millionaire



Mrs. Rosalind Harrington Frost

New York, Sept. 21.—There has been no reconciliation between Ellihu M. Frost, of New York and Atlantic City, president of the Submarine Boat Corporation, and Mrs. Rosalind Harrington Frost, of Garden City, L. I., though their counter suits for divorce have been withdrawn.

Major Henry D. Runyon of Jersey City, counsel for Mrs. Frost, said "a property settlement" had been made and the court has been notified of the withdrawal of the suits.

The order of the Court for the payment of \$100 a week alimony was therefore no longer in force, Major Runyon said. He would not disclose the terms of the settlement.

Robert H. McCarter, former Attorney-General of New Jersey, represented Mr. Frost.

Frost was fifty five years old and his wife twenty-five when they were married on June 18, 1915, by the Rev. James A. McDonald, a Methodist clergyman in Newark. They separated in May, 1919, and Mrs. Frost went to Nevada and started a suit for divorce which was discontinued.

In the petition which Mrs. Frost filed in New Jersey last December she accused her husband of cruel and inhuman conduct toward her and of infidelity with Mrs. Elsie Graham and Miss Odelline Martin in his apartments in Madison avenue, Manhattan, and his residence in Ventnor, near Atlantic City and at an Atlantic City hotel.

Her husband she said, told her he made \$1,000,000 in one day and that he was worth \$3,000,000. Her health, her petition said, had been wrecked by her husband's treatment.

The petition contained seventy typewritten pages, most of the allegations being unprintable.

Portland Post Station Robbed

Portland, Or., Sept. 21.—Two robbers held up a branch postoffice in a store on West Lombard street last night and robbed J. P. Brothers, proprietor of the store of \$20. The men tied Mr. Brothers to a chair in a back room and gagged him with a towel. Mr. Brothers told the police that one of the robbers entered by the front door and forced him into the back room at the point of a revolver. The other had entered the back door and was waiting in the rear room to stand guard over the prisoner while his partner ransacked the premises.

Mullinix Tells of Attempt to Murder Steiger

"We were to go 50-50." Jesse Mullinix, 45, confessed assailant of T. W. Steiger, 64, a farmer residing near Salem, made this statement Tuesday morning in reference to the alleged complicity of Mrs. Steiger in the attempt to kill her husband, March 25, 1920.

Mullinix, now serving a seven-year sentence for the attack upon the aged farmer, is the state's principal witness against Steiger's wife, Louisa Steiger, who is facing a jury in the Marion county court house, here. In answer to questions as to his relationship with Mrs. Steiger, Mullinix testified that she had embraced him several times and stated that she had been with him at his shack in Salem and also at different local lodging houses.

Defense Flights Evidence. Attorneys for the defense objected strenuously to all evidence that would disclose intimacy between Mullinix and Mrs. Steiger, but Circuit Judge Jerry B. Kelly, overruled these objections, calling attention to the evident unwillingness with which Mullinix answered all questions asked by the prosecution. Lodging house records showing the registration of "J. Smith" and wife, were identified by Mullinix as having been made by himself while accompanied by Mrs. Steiger.

Mullinix in his confession had identified certain letters as having been received from Mrs. Steiger and also identified a blue apron found in his shack near Shipping street as being apparel once the property of Mrs. Steiger. This apron was an exhibit at Tuesday's session.

Mullinix stated that talk of "doing away" with Steiger had followed confidences by Mrs. Steiger that her husband had "abused and choked her" during quarrels concerning Mullinix.

Farmer Is Witness. District Attorney James A. Helzel and Deputy Prosecutor Roy Shields first examined T. W. Steiger, who testified to the attack upon him by Mullinix. Mr. Steiger asserted that Mullinix had been dismissed after he had been for two years an employe at Steiger's farm. As a reason for the dismissal, Mul-

Mrs. Steiger, whose age is given as 62 years, is a white haired woman of worn appearance. Throughout the examination of her husband and Mullinix she betrayed little emotion except an occasional dab at her eyes with a handkerchief.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Steiger are well known in this county and the court chamber in department No. 1, was crowded nearly to a point of suffocation. After examining a venire of 75 names the task of selecting the jury for the Steiger case was completed Tuesday morning.

Giant Wireless Tower to Rise Near Hillsboro

Portland, Or., Sept. 21.—Erection of a giant wireless station near this city is assured, it was announced today through purchase by the Federal Telegraph company of a tract of 321 acres of land near Hillsboro as the site. Surveys for the aerial transmission station have already been made and actual construction work on power lines is expected to begin this week, it was said. The tower itself will be under construction within 30 days.
