Mehama Ferry Is Tied Up by Rising Water

High water in the Santiam river, it is said, has put the ferry boat out of commission at Mehama, and only foot passengers are carried over the stream. The Hammen stage line is considerably inconvenienced as a result of the freshet, but Mr. Hammen is making regular trips to and from Mill City on schedule time. Two stages are operated between Salem and the ferry and one between Mill City and the boat landing. The Mill City stage makes close connection with each stage from Salem and the passengers are conveyed over the river in a small boat.

It is believed that the bridge across the river cannot be completed during the winter and it is likely that this arrangement for the transportation of passengers from Salem to Mill City will have to be pursued all winter. The bridge, which was under course of construction by the county commissioners, was washed out several weeks ago when the first high water came.
