Miss Low had cabled her fiancé asking him to meet her upon her arrival. The cablegram, however, was misdirected and Tucker did not know that Miss Low was on her way to the United States. When she arrived Miss Low was sent to Ellis Island. She appealed to a theatrical organization, which located Tucker and he sped to New York and the ceremony followed immediately after his arrival.

Child Hygiene Convention Is On at St. Louis

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 12.—Splendid exhibits and a practical demonstration of public health nursing at the St. Louis Centers and Teaching Districts will be features of the annual meeting of the American Child Hygiene Association, which opened in this city Monday. The sessions will continue through Wednesday, and prominent physicians from all parts of the country will take part in the discussions. The principal address before the convention will be given by Herbert Hoover, Food Administrator during the World War. Various phases of maternal and child welfare will be discussed, and there will also be a round table discussion for public health nurses. The election of officers will be held on the closing day of the convention. The present officers of the association are: President, Dr. Philip Van Ingen, of New York City; vice-presidents, Dr. W. W. Chipman, of Montreal, and Dr. Howard Childs Carpenter, of Philadelphia; secretary, Dr. Henry F. Heinholtz, of Evanston, Ill.; treasurer, Austin McLanahan, of Baltimore. Dr. Henry L. K. Shaw, of Albany, is the president-elect of the association, who will succeed Dr. Van Ingen for the coming year.

1500 Laundry Men Gather At 'Frisco Meeting

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—More than 1,500 laundry owners, representing every State in the union gathered in San Francisco today for the thirty-ninth annual convention of the Laundry Owners' National Association. The delegates will remain in session five days. A foreign delegation for the first time in the history of the association is here to attend the deliberations of the American body. This delegation represents the Federated Laundry Associations of Great Britain, and is headed by James J. Stark, of London, secretary of the organization. He will address the delegates on the subject "Over There and Over Here." All business sessions will be held at the St. Francis Hotel. Address of welcome will be delivered by Governor William D. Stephens, of California, and Mayor James Rolph, Jr., of San Francisco. One of the most important matters to come before the convention is a plan to establish a national institute of laundering. Ways and means to finance such an institute were recently completed at a meeting in Chicago of the officers and executive committee of the Laundry Owners' National Association, and these plans will be submitted to the delegates for their approval during the San Francisco meeting. Present plans provide for the selection of a site near Chicago for the institute. A building of sufficient proportions to provide a convention hall and business quarters for the national officers will be erected. A model laundry equipped with the most modern machinery available, will also be built. It will be conducted as a commercial enterprise by the national officers and will set the best word in laundry efficiency. An elaborate programme for the entertainment of the delegates has been arranged.

Canadian Flour \$1 Cheaper Than Others at Boston

Boston Mass., Oct. 13.—Boston wholesale flour dealers and agents of Western flour mills declare that the difference in exchange between Canada and the United States enables the Canadian millers to put flour into Boston a dollar cheaper than the Western millers can, and still make a larger percentage of profit than American mills selling at the higher price. Boston is now being flooded with Canadian flour at prices ranging from 75 cents to a dollar cheaper than American flour. This is on the grades used by housewives who bake their own loaves. The flour used by bakers is sold by the Canadian millers on a closer margin, but even the smallest margin means a great deal to concerns that buy by the carload. The local wholesale flour merchants declare they cannot hope to compete with the Canadians and will have to remain out of the market as long as the Canadian supply holds out.

Woman Slayer Gets New Trial

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 12.—Federal Judge J. W. Woodrough today declared the death sentence imposed upon Alton B. Cole was invalid and remanded the prisoner back to the Howard county district court for a new trial. Judge Woodrough held that there has been no judicial determination of the degree of the crime. Cole was under sentence to die in the electric chair November 3 for complicity in the murder of Mrs. Lulu Vogt in Howard county in July, 1917. Twice as many women as men obtain divorces.

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Noted Houses On Riviera to Be On Market

Paris, Oct. 12.—Scores of houses belonging to Germans and situated along the French Riviera are to be sold by the French sequestration officials. Many of these buildings were taken over at the outbreak of the war and used as convalescent hospitals. A few of them were turned over to the American military authorities and hundreds of Doughboys were sent there to recuperate from wounds received in battle. Among the most noted of these houses is that owned by Frau Han and known as the Chateau Maresque. Before the war Frau Han used to go there and enjoy a long love idyll with young Count von Koenigsmark, a lieutenant in a Lithuanian regiment and a famous spy. He quit the Riviera just before the war and carefully removed jewelry belonging to Frau Han which she never recovered. Count von Koenigsmark had a palace overlooking the Golfe Juan, where he often organized middle-aged festivities. Chateau Robert is a little further away and was the property of Herr von Jellinek-Mercedes, who fled from France and against whose name inquiry was opened for confiscation of firearms. Baroness Ottenfeld also had a large property along the coast. It became famous after a "Latin orgy" had been organized there and when all went well and merry till the morning when the baroness discovered \$80,000 worth of jewelry had mysteriously disappeared.

Weary Willies May Have Hobo College, Report

Kansas City, Oct. 13.—"Red riders," hoboes and tramps who have banded themselves together under the name of Casual and Traveling Workers and elected as their leader J. Eads How, M. D., known as "the millionaire hobo," held a meeting recently and voted unanimously to endow a hobo college in Kansas City sometime during the coming winter. No faculty was named and, though the curriculum of the proposed hobo college was only lightly touched upon, it is understood there will be courses in higher domestic science. This course will include such subjects as preparing a "mulligan" without onions and potatoes and making bread pudding desert without the bread. "Tip-toe" Murphy addressed the meeting and told the charter members of the Casual and Traveling Workers he might be induced to take a chair in the faculty.
