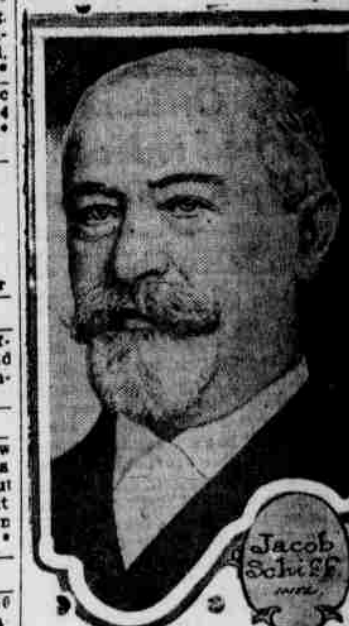

300-Mile Horse Race Continues

Race Continued

Port Ethas Allen, Vt., Oct. 1.

A 300-mile endurance test for horses was started to-day from Cambridgeport. The finish will be at Cambridge, Ayer, Mass., on Friday night, November 1.

More than 100 horses were entered for the race.

This is the second annual test. Representatives of all breeds of horses that are suitable for the development of weight carriers were entered.

Each rider weighs at least 150 pounds and is obliged to carry at least 100 pounds of equipment and dead weight. The horses must travel 60 miles a day.

The United States Government has a number of entries. Army officers ride them. There are several cow ponies from the War Department. Horses carried off by the Arabs last year. This fall they have Arab competition. Five thorough-breds, all former race horses, have been in training in Kentucky for several months and received a month's final condition over the mountain trails of the State.

The judges are Major C. A. Eaton, New York, chairman; Mr. Henry Leonard, U. S. Marine Corps, and Harry W. Smith, former attorney, chase rider.
