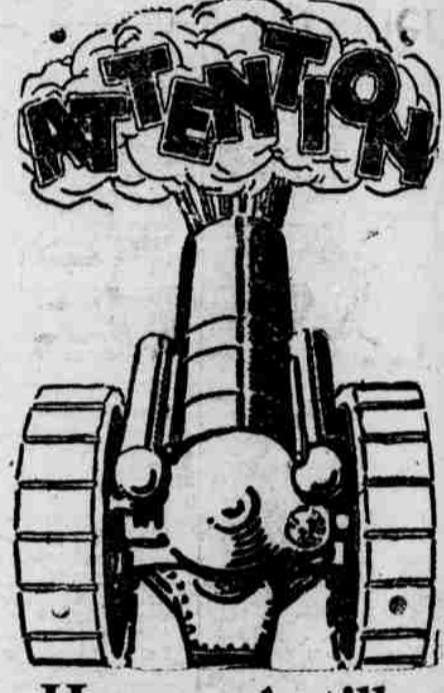
Wisconsin
Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 2.—Returns from all but five counties in Wisconsin reporting 1912 election results showed Harding leading Cox almost five to one and Debs, socialist, pulling a long race.
The senatorship and state tests were closer, with the republican candidates leading by moderate pluralities. Except in the fourth and fifth congressional districts (Milwaukee county) the socialist vote is expected strong and the republican returns were nip and tuck, a solid publican delegation appeared to have been elected.
Milwaukee Wis., Nov. 2.—Stafford, republican, at 7 o'clock today led Victor L. Berger socialist by more than 1700 with returns from 51 precincts out of 85 in fifth congressional district reported.
The vote was Stafford 24,307.
