### Austrians Ask Permission to Go Into Georgia

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 3.—"Will the High Governor of the state of Georgia graciously consent to permit war refugees from Austria to emigrate there and settle in safety?"

This is the substance of a letter received by Governor Dorse from Fraulein Anna Lorbeerbaum, who gives her address as Vienna, Austria, 11 Grosse Schiffgasse 19.

In a letter filled with respectful phrases that reveal the attitude of the citizens of the old countries toward their rulers Fraulein Lorbeerbaum tells of the plight of the war refugees in Vienna, without adequate housing or food. She says they will all go to "ruin and ruin" unless they are permitted to emigrate to other countries and says: "Gracious Governor, one powerful word from you and numerous men otherwise drifting to despair would be given fresh courage to face life."

She asks a limited number be allowed to come to this state. They are the blameless victims of the war, all of them thrifty, sober, respectable people, in good position of life, artisans, workmen, merchants, etc. who would be no burden to any state, and would be thankful if they were given a chance of settling down somewhere and following their calling.

The governor has not yet indicated what action he will take on the letter.
