10 Mill Tax On Dallas for Road Purposes

Dallas, Or., Nov. 10.—At a meeting held last Thursday evening, it was agreed that an additional tax levy of 10 mills will be made on Dallas city property.

The city is a road district and the proposed levy will raise approximately \$10,000 which will be used on the main roads leading out of town which are now in bad condition. As there is a regular tax for this purpose of approximately \$5000 and the county court has agreed to match the total of the two sums, this will give Dallas in the neighborhood of \$15,000 to put its county road streets in shape.

The meeting in which the agreement was made to put the matter before the people was held last Thursday evening by the directors of the Commercial club and the members of the city council. In this meeting the matter was thoroughly discussed and it was reported that the judge of the county court had agreed to place in the county budget the sum of \$15,000 to match the money it is proposed that this road district should raise for the improvement. This agreement with the county court, it is said, is necessary before the question can be submitted.

The proceeding that must be gone through to secure a meeting to pass upon such a matter is that the freeholders petition the county court and the court calls a meeting to pass upon the matter. Notice of this meeting must be given through the newspapers and by posted notices.

K. of P. Hold Meeting.

The Knights of Pythias lodge at Dallas held their usual Monday night meeting in their hall where they initiated several candidates in the rank of squire. The local K. P.'s are planning on taking 25 candidates for the rank of page to Albany on November 29, where Fred E. Wheaton, supreme keeper of records and seals, and William Ladew of New York, supreme chancellor, will give the class of about 500 the work in this rank.

The order of K. P. was founded 55 years ago in the city of Washington, D. C., by Justus H. Rathbone and the bible which he used for the obligations to the first candidates for the great order will be used at Albany next Monday night. The work will be known as the Rathbone Bible class.

The city council met at the council chambers last night for a special meeting to consider the settlement with Pugh & Sauer, contractors, who have been laying sidewalks in the city of Dallas. It was reported at the meeting that the contractors have a bill for \$13,000 for sidewalk work on the private owned property and 1630 feet of five foot sidewalk which is to be paid by the city. The cost per linear foot has been 96 1/2 cents. The council has advanced about \$13,000 to the contractors and labor bills were out which demanded payment of about \$2000 more, so the council ordered the auditor to draw a warrant for Pugh & Sauer for that sum. The city engineer, Ed J. Himes, was asked to have a complete report of all work done, material turned over to the city and everything in readiness for a final settlement by the regular council meeting on Monday night next.

Born in Switzerland.

Abbot Adelhelm Oedermt was born in Switzerland, December 10, 1844. Responding to the calling within he entered the novitiate of St. Benedictine abbey in Engelberg, the motherhouse of Mt. Angel. On September 29, 1866, he made his holy profession and on May 3, 1869, was ordained priest. In 1873 he was sent across the Atlantic with Father Frowin Conrad, founder and abbot of Conception

abbey, Mo. He was stationed at Marysville until 1881, when he came to the northwest to make arrangements for the new monastic foundation in the Willamette valley. He was founder of the St. Benedictine college and has been actively in the service of that institution and the church in this region for many years. The golden sacerdotal jubilee of Rt. Rev. Adelhelm Oedermt was held here a little less than one year ago.

Suffers Stroke.

Monday, November 1, being All Saints day, Father Adelhelm was preparing for the 10 o'clock mass at St. Joseph's church in Portland when he suffered a stroke of pa-

ralysis. The altar boys found him unconscious on the floor of the sanctuary. Hastening to the cathedral for help, Archbishop Christie with one of his priests went to the assistance of the stricken abbot and he was immediately removed to St. Vincent's hospital where he was given every attention possible. In the afternoon he regained consciousness but never regained the power of speech. He continued to fall in spite of the careful attention paid him and passed away Sunday night.

Mt. Angel Folk Honor Memory Of Dead Abbot

Mt. Angel, Or., Nov. 10.—Remains of the Right Rev. Titular Abbot Adelhelm Oedermt, who died at St. Vincent's hospital in Portland Sunday night, were received here this morning and pontifical services were held at 10 o'clock. Business houses closed between the hours of 10 and 12 and the entire population of the city attended the services. Interment was made in the monastery cemetery on the hill near the college.

For some time this morning the body rested at St. Benedict's abbey where hundreds of friends called to pay their last respects to a venerable priest, and a friend of all humanity.

Memorial Mass Held.

Memorial mass was held in Portland yesterday morning immediately after this service the body was shipped to this city. Honorary pallbearers at the services in Portland were Judge J. D. Kavanaugh, J. E. Forester, John R. Murphy, Harry Klosterman and B. O. Farrell.

The funeral is said to have been the largest ever held in the Mt. Angel church and was attended by friends from Portland, Salem and numerous other towns in the state. All day Monday the body lay in state at St. Joseph's church in
