Great Britain and France Make Day One of National Significance with King George and President Millerand Participate; American Observance is Local

(By the Associated Press) Impressive ceremonies were held in London and Paris today, the people of the French and British nations celebrating the second anniversary of the closing of the world war and paying tribute to the men who sacrificed their lives during the titanic struggle. The body of an unknown British soldier was buried in Westminster Abbey, King George, governmental chiefs and relatives of missing soldiers witnessing the interment. In Paris, the body of a French soldier, taken from a nameless grave at Verdun, was laid at rest under the Arc De Triomphe. President Millerand, three French marshals—Joffre, Foch and Pétain—stood by the open grave.

A record crowd attended the Armistice day ceremonies at the Salem armory this morning. The auditorium was decorated with the national colors and the Elks orchestra provided a brief musical program prior to the appearance of Judge R. R. Butler, who delivered the principal address.
