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25-Acre Field Yields 26,000 Pounds of Hops

Aurora, Or., Nov. 11.—Henry L. Bents recently received 146 bales of hops contracted for Strauss & Co., from J. P. Ranzau of near Newberg. The 146 bales weighed 27,566 pounds net. More than 26,000 pounds of the crop was grown on 25 acres, the balance being grown on five acres of red vines on upland. All are first year hops and are of excellent quality. The crop has been contracted for three years at 40 cents.

This year's crop was produced by three men, Mr. Ranzau, his son and one hired man. The crop brought over \$11,000 and should bring \$20,000 next year. The yard was cultivated well, sprayed well and cared for in an excellent manner in every way.
