Washington, Nov. 24.—Russian soviet authorities estimate that the unemployed in this country will number five million by the end of the year and two representatives of the third internationale have been sent to organize soviets here, according to information from Moscow.

The representatives of the internationale plan to arrive in the United States in December, it was said, and propose to form commit-

United States in December, it was said, and propose to form committees of the unemployed in connection with the communist party, establishing soviets of each trade. Their mission, the advices stated, is to unite the revolutionary movement in America into one fighting body to bring about armed revolution.

While government officials discounted the internationale's estimate of unemployment every precaution is being taken to keep the counter organizers from entering soviet organizers from entering the United States.
