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## Farmers From Three States Meet In Dallas

Dallas, Dec. 8.—The annual convention of the southern Idaho, Washington and Oregon Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union opened its session yesterday morning at 10 o'clock in the W. O. W. hall and was attended by about 150 delegates and visitors from the three states.

Floyd D. Moore, representing Mayor U. S. Grant and the city council, gave the opening address of welcome and presented the key of the city to the visitors. This was followed by an address of welcome by P. O. Powell vice president of the Farmers Union of Polk county. The answer to these addresses was made by Senator Walter M. Pierce from La Grande who gave an excellent address upon the spirit and progress of the farmers union organization. Other speakers were A. V. Swift, national vice president of the Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union; Senator C. W. Booth from Idaho, also ex-President Brown of eastern Oregon. W. C. Langdon of Kansas City, Kan., was one of the speakers and said, in part, "the condition unsatisfactory to the promotion of the farm industry of today was due mainly to the unfair use of money procured from the banks against the farmers interest, resulting in an amount of nearly 6 billion dollars loss to the farmers from July to November of this year."

## Change Sought In Silverton Salem Highway

Silverton, Ore., Dec. 8.—Changing the highway between Salem and Silverton has been suggested by some of the farmers giving adjacent to the road which they wish to become the main thoroughfare, and they feel that so many distinct advantages are offered that the proposition should be given most serious consideration before the road between the two towns is hard surfaced, which it eventually will be. Many residents of Silverton, it is said, favor the change.

The new route tentatively outlined would follow what is known as the Poor Farm road from the corner east of the Howell store to a point near the Silverton cemetery where the road enters the city limits. The present road is very winding and has two or three bad and dangerous places especially in the winter season when the water from Pudding river overflows the banks. There has never been a season, it is said, when the water did not cover the road to quite a depth for some distance east of the Pudding river bridge, and cannot be avoided without the expenditure of a great deal of money.
