ber of years past. The building is fitted up for a moving picture theatre and has been leased by Mr. Uglow who operates the Majestic theater, so as to keep other show people from establishing a permanent show. #### Fire Ordinance Read.

The fire ordinance, which was read for the second time, including all two story buildings inhabited by hotel people or rooming house proprietors, requiring them to have suitable fire escapes, was discussed and an amendment was offered but the council postponed amending of the ordinance until the next regular meeting. Mr. Soehren thought it advisable to include all buildings in town as well as the rooming houses and hotels.

The amount of \$210, which is in the library fund, was turned over to the library board for the use of maintaining the library.

The council was waited upon by a body of citizens who were dissatisfied with the cement walks recently laid by Pugh & Sauer, bringing objections because the surface of the walks are crumbling. Several citizens thought it impossible to repair the walks and heated arguments followed. The report of City Engineer Ed Himes stated that the walks could be satisfactorily remedied for three cents per square foot when suitable weather conditions would permit the repair.

Mr. Himes stated that the cause of the deterioration was due to sprinkling the top surface too soon after the walks had been laid and traffic upon the walks before they were set.

A. J. Mott, who runs a second hand store, accused the city engineer of neglect in not causing the contractors and their employees to lay the walks in first class condition. Mr. Mott dealt in personalities to the extent that caused Councilman Moore to resent his remarks and suggested that the city engineer's report be considered and that the necessary money be withheld from the sum due the contractors until they repair the walks in the spring. Upon motion by Councilman Murr, the report of the city engineer was adopted after which the dissatisfied citizens dispersed.

The resignation of City Attorney Ed F. Coad, was read and accepted and the appointment of a city attorney was laid over until the next regular meeting.

On report of the budget committee it was ascertained that the budget was too high, they having figured on a valuation of \$1,100,000; the valuation set by the commission being \$1,064,000. As a result of
