Aggies To Lose Mainstays of Football Team
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Dec. 11.—From two to seven of this year's letter men in football will be missing when Coach Dick Rutherford calls the roll next fall. Captain Rose and Swan, tackle, will graduate. The eligibility of Powell and Stewart for further intercollegiate football depends on the interpretation of the conference with regard to S. A. T. C. letters counting on the three-year eligibility. McCart and Christensen, linemen and Seely, will not return if they make sufficient credits for graduation.
Several good prospects are on hand to fill all the possible vacancies. Best of all of these is "Cac" Campbell, stellar lineman of last year's team, who was ineligible for varsity this year on account of leaving school last year. Loughry is considered the pick of the book material to fill Rose's shoes at end. In the line, Boise, Taggart, Shields and Gibson are likely prospects. Jessup and Gill are considered best backfield prospects with Garity and Tousey strong candidates as understudies.

Students Exceed Quota In Drive
The drive of the Willamette missionary committee to raise \$600 has succeeded beyond expectations as early reports indicate that \$700 or over has been contributed to the fund, according to the announcement Saturday of Hubert Wilken, treasurer of the committee.
Three hundred dollars of this amount will be sent to Miss Aetna Emmel, a former student of Willamette, who is now a missionary in India. \$300 will be given to the students of central Europe who are suffering for want of food, clothing and many of the necessities of life, and the remaining \$100 will be sent to the national headquarters of the Y. W. C. A. at New York city.
