

Bill Regulating Packers Is Held To Be Dangerous

Washington, Jan. 21.—Enactment of the bill providing government regulation of the meat packing industry would be a step "filled with danger to our institutions and our system of government," Senator Fernald, republican of Maine, declared today in the senate.

"I believe this bill is merely the opening wedge for similar regulation of other private business," he said.

Analyzing the testimony before the senate committee which framed the bill, Senator Fernald said it made "unworthy of belief" the federal trade commission's report on its investigation of the packing industry. The commission statement that small packers existed at the expense of the big concerns, he denied before the committee. The senator said, by representatives of more than twenty small packing firms. Likewise, he said, the commission's assertion that stock growers were "at the mercy of the big five packers" was contradicted by practically all of the more than 50 growers who testified.

\$300,000 For New Training School Asked

Three hundred thousand dollars would be appropriated for the construction of a training school for boys to replace the present Oregon State training school, under the provisions of a bill following out the recommendations contained in the message of Governor Scott, which was introduced by Senator Patterson. The new institution, if it provided would be under the jurisdiction of the state board of control, who would be authorized to construct the necessary buildings as soon as possible on lands already owned by the state within Marion county.

The buildings and structures for the proposed new training school are to be constructed according to modern, advanced and practical methods of conducting such an institution, and the chief object of the new institution would be educational and reformatory.

In the event the bill meets with the approval of the legislators and the new training school materializes, it is proposed to convert the present training school into a reformatory school for boys who are now committed to the state prison in the absence of any other provision for their care.

Greater Power Is Sought for Fire Marshal

Increased powers are conferred on the state fire marshal in a bill introduced in the house by the house committee on insurance. Procedure on investigation of causes of fires is outlined and the bill provides that if the fire marshal is of the opinion there is sufficient evidence to charge a person with arson, burning with intent to defraud or prejudice the insurer or a similar crime, he shall furnish the district attorney such evidence with names of witnesses and a copy of the material testimony and request the district attorney to cause arrests and take such other action as may be advisable. The district attorney is then to summon such witnesses and take their testimony and lay the matter before the grand jury if he deems sufficient evidence is available.

The state fire marshal's department is to be maintained by a tax on premiums received from insurance

concerning business transacted in the state—a sum equal to one-half per cent of the gross premiums on assessments on their equipment within the state.

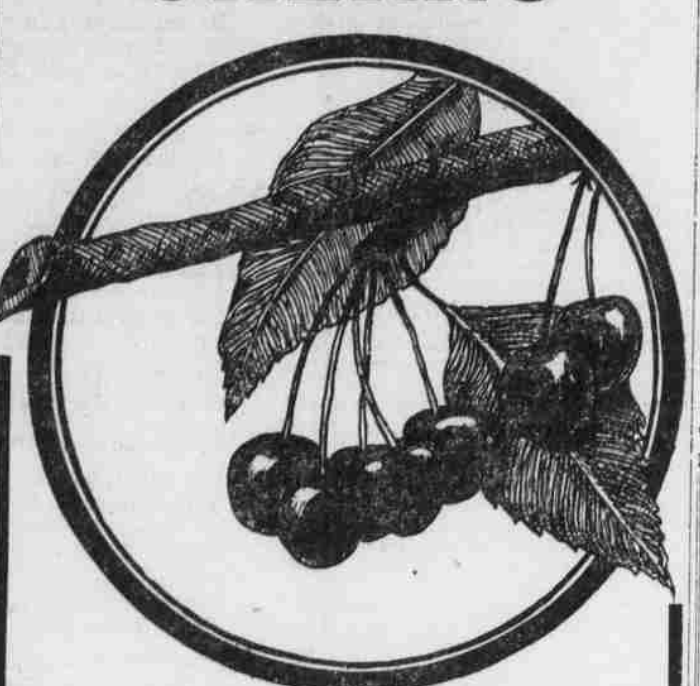
It is reported that this new rate will bring a revenue of about \$25,000 a year, netting to the state approximately \$10,000 above the cost of the department, say members of the house who have studied the situation.

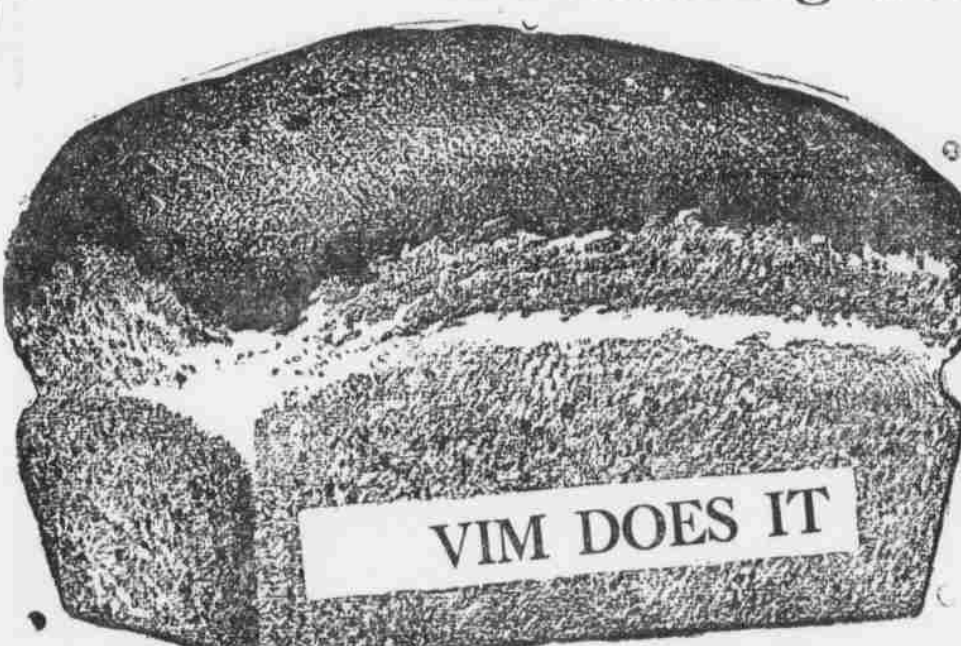

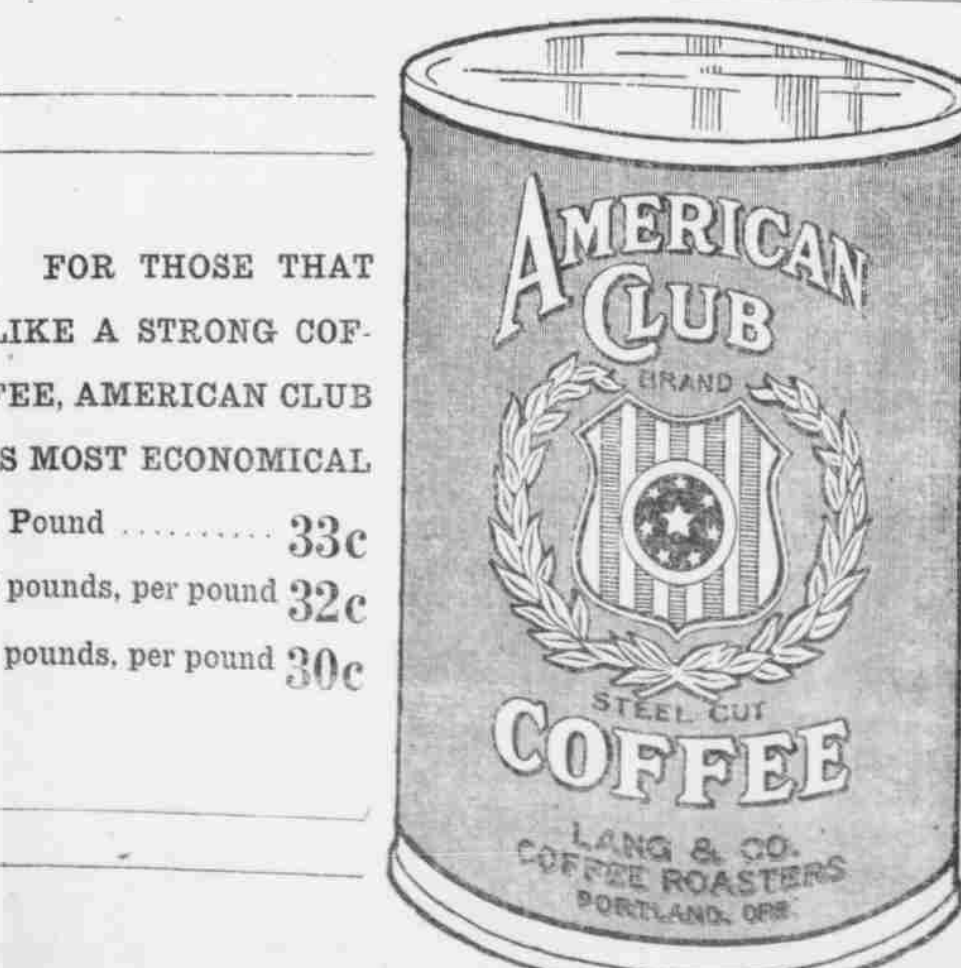
