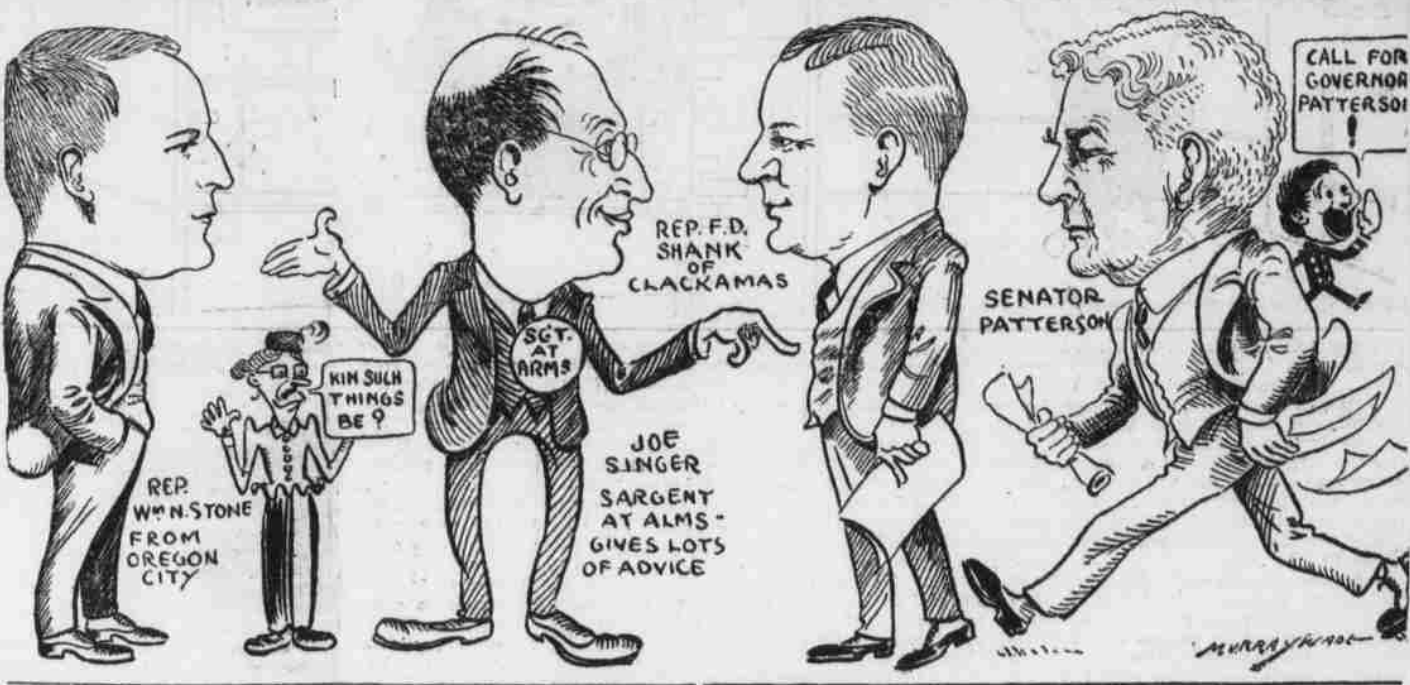
Bed-Ridden Man Burned to Death
