

Silverton Youth Missing; Fear Felt for Safety

Silverton, Or., Feb. 11.—Left alone on the farm near here to care for the stock during the winter, Oliver Holman, 20 years, came up missing during the latter part of last week and upon investigation of the neighbors it developed that the cattle and horses had been neglected. Al Schindler, a neighbor living a short distance from the Holman home, has been looking after the stock while other friends of the family are trying to locate the young man.

Mr. Holman's father died about one year ago, and last fall his mother and her brother, J. P. Harbo, went to California to spend the winter, hoping to find better health. Young Holman, who has always been a trustful and careful boy on the farm, was left in charge of the stock. The reason can be assigned for his sudden and unexpected departure.

It is reported that the young man was seen in Portland Monday, and up to late yesterday nothing more had been heard from him. Mr. Harbo and Mrs. Holman have been notified of his departure and it is expected that they will return soon to look after their interests. It was reported that he had expressed a desire to join the army and it is thought probable that this is his reason for leaving home, although the report was not substantiated.

Mt. Angel People Seek Improvement of Saafeld Hill

Mt. Angel, Or., Feb. 11.—Eighty-four farmers and business men at Mt. Angel have contributed \$375.00 to be used in improving the road over the Saafeld hill west of town. The paper containing the names of the contributors, together with a petition asking permission to do the work, will be presented to the county court in a few days. They will ask no assistance from the county in making the improvement but simply want permission to do the work. The road in that vicinity is said to be dangerous to travel at night because of a danger curve in the road and the plan is to make a cut in the hill in a manner to straighten the road and the dirt removed will be filled in at the foot of the hill making less grade. If the petition is granted, and it is believed that it will be, work of making the cut will be commenced in a short time.

Nick Schmalz Jr. and Mrs. Carrie Gooch, both of this city, were married in Oregon City on Tuesday of this week, according to reports received here yesterday. Mrs. Gooch was the wife of Ben Gooch, a former merchant of this city and secured a divorce from her husband less than a year ago.

The city council met Monday evening, but adjourned without transacting business until Thursday evening. At the meeting Thursday evening the regular routine of business occupied the attention of the city dads for nearly two hours.

A fire alarm system has just been installed in the new St. Mary's school building and to try it out the alarm was turned in yesterday for a fire drill, which has become a frequent practice in the schools. When the mechanics finished laying the tile roof on the school building yesterday every detail was completed in the construction of the great school building which was commenced early last season. Mt. Angel citizens feel proud of their building and they have a right to be.

A state nurse representing the state health committee was in town a few days ago and visited the schools and colleges. She started some very wholesome work in the schools, particularly among the grade pupils, and parents are noting the improvement in the younger generation.
