Woodburn High Defeats Hubbard On Latter's Floor

Hubbard, Feb. 21.—For the first time in two years the Hubbard high basketball team was defeated on its own floor, by the Woodburn high school five, Friday night. The final score was 17-7.

Lack of team work and combination plays was the cause of Hubbard's defeat and it was because of the visitors' ability to work together as a single unit that they were able to win, although at a disadvantage on a strange floor.

Hubbard was able to maintain the lead until the last ten minutes of play when Graves of Woodburn shot a basket from the middle of the floor. This performance put renewed life into his team mates from that time on till the end of the game, the Woodburn quintet dropped in one basket after another until they had built up a ten point lead over their opponents when the final whistle blew.

Taken as individual the Hubbard players compared favorably with the men on the Woodburn team, but they could not play together as a unit, and were unable to break up the Woodburn machine once it got started.

Yamhill Growers Hold Big Meeting

Fruit growers from McMinnville, Carlton, Forest Grove and Dayton were in attendance. The meeting was called just to observe Prune week and to hear addresses on the general fruit situation.

Jury Disagrees Asks Discharge

Journal's Weekly Book Review

"Finding a way out", an autobiography, by Robert Russa Moton.

At the age of eighteen, the negro boy, Robert Russa Moton, resisted the urgent invitation of his friends to become a candidate for the state legislature. Instead he chose, to carry farther the education begun in his father's cabin.

Almost from his entrance into Hampton Institute his purpose has been to find, for the colored people, "a way out" through education. His cause has been his life, and his autobiography is the story of negro education in the cabins, in the free schools, and in the institutes at Hampton and Tuskegee.

With fine sympathy and clear understanding he depicts the leaders who laid the foundations of the work, General Armstrong and Booker T. Washington, with both of whom his association had been close. Prevaling his story is that kindly spirit which Booker T. Washington describes in his book "My higher education." He says "Major Moton is a man who, without jobbing himself and without knowing how he does it, makes you believe in him from the very first time you see him, and at the same time makes you love him. It has been through contact with men like Major Moton—clean, wholesome, high-souled gentlemen under black skins—that I have received a kind of education no books could impart."

Immediately upon the death of Booker T. Washington the trustees asked Major Moton to leave his duties as disciplinary officer over the negroes and Indians at Hampton to become the president of Tuskegee Institute. In the last chapter of "Finding a way out" he tells the result of his efforts to carry on the work under the policies of his predecessor.

Four Amendments
Washington, Feb. 21.—Attempts of the house and senate conference committees to iron out differences in the Fordney emergency tariff today were successful with respect to four amendments, but three others, all of which were added by the senate, were passed over until another meeting tomorrow.

The conference session ended, however, with its members widely separated on the questions of duties on wheat, olives and sugar and also as to the length of long staple cotton which should be protected.

Another thing is the improvement of the public school lawns. This will take money, which must be raised. Last year the society had hardly enough funds to carry on its work for material and labor were so high. Nearly all shrubbery used was donated, and the \$175 raised through membership did not go very far.

Another thing planned is to get the Odd Fellows to improve their cemetery which is on the Pacific highway and is said to be in need of improvement.

Charging inhuman treatment, Mrs. Lulu Pierce, third wife of L. R. M. Pierce, of Salem, obtained a divorce decree after Judge Blingham had heard the testimony of witnesses Saturday morning.

Mrs. Pierce charged that her husband borrowed money from her to entertain other women, particularly Miss Anna Forest, whom he brought to the Pierce home to stay for several weeks, and with whose company he was seen in Portland.

She also charged that the mother of her husband, Mrs. Mattie A. Parrish, borrowed three thousand dollars from her, and never paid it back, and made life so unbearable for her that when she left the Pierce home she was broken down physically.

Pierce was married for the first time in February, 1909, and obtained a divorce in November of the same year. In 1911 he married again and sought another divorce from his wife in 1913. He married his last wife in 1917.

Similar Names for Blower System May Bring Trouble

Silverton, Ore., Feb. 21.—Mayor L. C. Eastman, according to information just received from the patent office at Washington, D. C., may be made defendant in another damage case. In a letter received from the patent office from Washington it is learned that a company at Detroit, Mich., known as the American Blower company, which is manufacturing a blower system similar to the one manufactured by Eastman Brothers in this city, and which is patented under the trade mark "Sibloco," has filed objections in the patent office at Washington to the Silverton Blower company's receiving a patent on their blower under the trade mark "Sibloco." based on the similarity in names. The Silverton Blower Pipe company advertised a year ago, offering a prize to the person giving the most appropriate name for the blower system which was introduced and built by Eastman Brothers. The name "Sibloco" was suggested and adopted by the manufacturer. Mr. Eastman is investigating the matter. If it has been extensively advertised under this name, and if it becomes necessary to find a new name for the system, it will work a hardship on the business that has already been established.

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
