

Can't Live On Pay; Asks Parliament For Higher Salary

London, March 21.—Interesting evidence on how inadequate the average member of Parliament's salary is if he is without a private income was put before the select committee set up by Mr. Dan Irving, M. P., for Burnley.

"I reckon," said Mr. Irving, "that on an average I spend in London, after allowing for the time that I am away, \$14 a week, which includes postage, street car fares, food in the house and a single room in which to live."

Mr. Irving said the \$1,600 salary is now his only regular income. He had to give up his regular occupation when he became an M. P.

Out of this he pays \$420 a year for his third class railroad fare.

He has to keep two homes, one in Burnley, where his family live, and the other in London, where he himself resides.

"To keep up these two homes," he said, "with my railroad fare brings my expenses up to \$1,450—not a cent for clothing, either for myself or my wife. One does not really live on the \$1,600 a year; I cannot do it."

"The only possible way that I could do it at all would be to abandon going home, except at the end of the session, and to give up my railroad pass."

"I have to devote time, attention and study to other methods of increasing my income, otherwise I could not possibly live."

No change in M. P.'s salaries, but that no income tax should be charged on the salary.

That M. P.'s should have free first-class railroad passes between London and their constituencies—but not their homes.

\$100,000 Fund To Put Corsets Back On Women Raised

Paris, Mar. 21.—A \$100,000 campaign fund has been raised by French corset manufacturers in an effort to bring corsets back into favor. It was announced today by representatives of Farcy and Oppenheim, one of the largest corset manufacturers in France. English and American manufacturers will be asked to contribute on the ground that both England and America derive their fashions from France and that manufacturers in these countries will benefit by the return of the corset to favor.

"We intend to spend a part of our fund to demonstrate that the corset is really a sensible woman's help," said the chairman of Farcy and Oppenheim. "At the same time we are negotiating with some of the big Paris dressmakers to induce them to create styles that will make the wearing of corsets indispensable. A number of them have promised support."

Most of the Paris dressmakers believe that the \$100,000 will be wasted.

"Women are getting away from the corset and will never go back to it—at least, extensively," said M. Veron, who has an establishment on the Rue de la Paix. "Nowadays women want to feel comfortable, and how can they with corsets. Furthermore, everyone dances in these days. How can a woman fox trot if she is bound up in stays?"

John Saefer, who sold his 26 acre tract near town recently to Arthur Saefer, has purchased the Je-Kluppenger residence property on Taylor street.

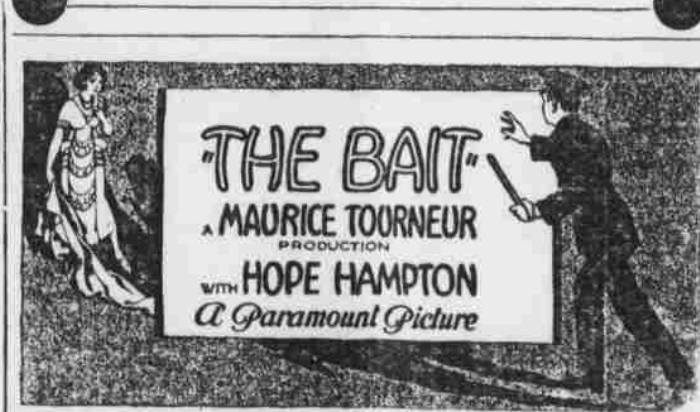
