## Community Clubs Discuss Poultry Show

Donald, Mar. 30.—The Marion County Federation of Community Clubs held their regular monthly meeting at Donald Thursday evening, with a large outside attendance from different communities about the county. Salem Heights was unusually well-represented by sixteen delegates who were able to give much experience in the formation of the work that could be accomplished by any community for the uplift and advancement of local environments.

There were present also representatives from Salem, Jefferson, Brooks, Silverton, Woodburn and Hubbard.

This meeting took up especially the subjects of advancing the poultry industry in the county and also plans were started by the federation for the corn and poultry shows, which are to be held in Salem this fall, under the auspices of the federation.

## Potato Growers Dispose of Large Surplus On Hand

Hubbard, Or., Mar. 29.—With the opening of spring, holders of potatoes appear quite conspicuously on the anxious seat and are using all possible means to dispose of the surplus on hand. Three cars were loaded here a few days ago with spuds, one each by Messrs. Morris, Yoder and Hirschberger. While the market price is lower than the growers had hoped it would be, the Hubbard men have received a good price for the product because of superior quality. It is stated that the acreage will be as large during this year as it was last. Hubbard has always been a great potato producing section and it is not expected to fall short of the average during the year 1921.

## Dallas To Have New School If Plans Go Through

Dallas, Or., Mar. 30.—The local school board will meet on April 21 in regular monthly session, at which time information relative to the erection of a new building will be ready for publication. During the past year manual training was not included in the high school course owing to the demands for higher salary by the manual training instructors. Many applications have lately been received by W. I. Ford, superintendent of schools, and the course will be re-installed next term. Applications are coming into the superintendent's office from teachers from all parts of the state and the election of school teachers for the coming year will be held within a short time.

## Man Injured By Runaway

Roseburg, Ore., Mar. 30.—E. D. Lewis, proprietor of the Rough Dry laundry, was seriously injured last night when the team which he was driving ran away on Main street. The team was in the rear of the Elks' building when it became frightened and started to run north. When almost directly in the rear of the Hamilton Drug Co. the horse collided with an automobile and Mr. Lewis was then thrown from the delivery wagon. He struck on his head and shoulder, being knocked unconscious by the impact. His scalp was badly cut, his face bruised and his collar bone broken. His shoulder was badly hurt and his back sprained. He was taken to the office of Dr. Sether who treated his injuries, later conveying him to the injured man's home. The team continued its flight to court as well as could be expected today.

## Albany Doctor To Form Guard Medical Unit

Albany, Mar. 30.—Dr. G. E. Riggs has been designated by Adjutant General White to organize in Albany a medical detachment of the Oregon National guard. The detachment will be a medical unit for artillery, but will be separate and distinct from the artillery company mustered-in here this week. One sergeant, one corporal and seven first class privates will compose the detachment and Dr. Riggs asks that any desiring to enlist in this branch of the service, either call on him personally or be at the armory at 7 o'clock Wednesday night, previous to the first regular drill of the artillery company.

## Native Resident Buried In Lebanon

Albany, Mar. 30.—The last survivor of the children of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Sommers, who took up the donation land claim on which the Sodaville springs are located, Mrs. Isoura Parrish, died in Portland last week, and was buried in the Lebanon Masonic cemetery last Sunday. Mrs. Parrish had made her home on the land claim of her parents since her birth February 26, 1852, and was known to many people over the state. During the 69 years of her life she had spent but a few months altogether away from the old home place.

Her father donated the springs and an acre of land to the state, which has resulted in the present improvements, and the last legislature made another appropriation of several hundred dollars to improve the grounds.

Mrs. Parrish is survived by three daughters and one son, Mrs. Estella Blevins, of Portland; Mrs. Della Overton, of Woodburn; Mrs. Ailie McCullough, of Kallsap, Mont.; and A. H. Parrish, who resides on the old donation land claim near Sodaville.

## Honesty Best Policy States Hubbard Man

Hubbard, Mar. 30.—Although so timid about seeking newspaper publicity that he would not consent to give his name for publication, Hubbard has one man who has decided that "honesty is the best policy," according to a letter received by F. M. Brown, chief deputy state game warden. The penitent message contained a check covering back pay for fishing licenses.

"I have made a decision," the letter reads, "which I wish everyone in this land would make, namely, a decision to be strictly honest, and my conception of honesty is that it is everyone's duty to pay his taxes, and as hunting and angling fees or license fees are a kind of a tax, I enclose the amount necessary to cover three unpaid license fees which is \$4.50. I know it is a common practice with many to dodge paying their obligations for hunting and fishing. But that day is past with me. Will close, hoping I may never need write you the same letter again."

## Many Candidates Expect Roseburg Postmastership

Roseburg, Ore., Mar. 30.—With the expectation that a change will be made in the office of postmaster as a result of the change in administration, a number of republicans in this city have announced themselves as candidates for the position and the campaign is beginning to take on an active aspect. Several of those who were early in the race have withdrawn and are no longer seeking the appointment, and the contest has now simmered down to five, namely: G. W. Young, C. S. Heinline, A. J. Geddes, R. R. Wood and James E. Sawyers.

## Gervais Mint Root Acreage Is Large

Gervais, Or., Mar. 30.—From the amount of mint roots that are being shipped to different parts of the state from Gervais it would seem that the acreage of peppermint in the Willamette valley is to be greatly enlarged during the spring. J. G. Moisan and F. R. Moisan shipped a carload of mint roots to Mr. Davies of Klamath Falls, for the association at that place, who will plant 300 acres of 32 h1C2mkt—ATW...Hch.F TH mint in that section this spring. Moisan Brothers have sent out a large quantity of roots this spring and have other orders yet to be filled. Digging roots in the Gervais yards has become quite an industry.

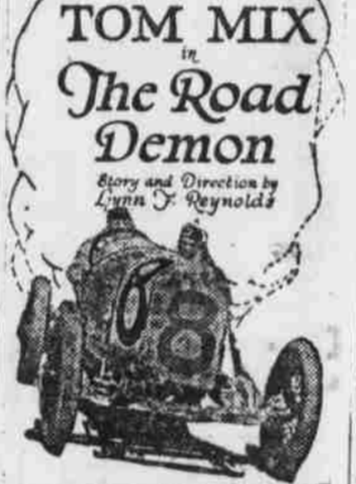
## Judge Extends Boy's Sentence

Roseburg, Ore., March 30.—Fifteen days more have been added to the jail sentence of Will Knicker, Oakland boy, because he ran away. 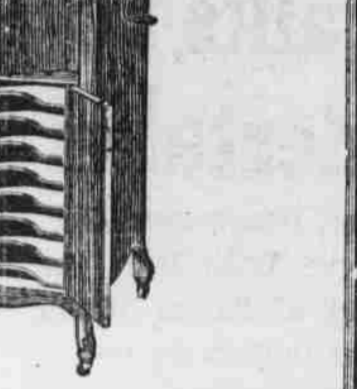
