

Co-eds Can Earn Own Way, Claim

School Is Enjoyed More When Student Pays Expenses, Girl Declares

Wooster, Ohio, April 5.—Mere man had no corner on the business of working one's way through college.

Co-eds at Wooster college testify to this assertion in essays they have submitted to college authorities in a contest on "How I Worked My Way Through College."

Girls attending the college pay their expenses by performing various tasks, including cleaning house, ironing, waiting table, doing office work, caring for babies, doing laboratory work, doing dishes at college dormitories, tutoring and working in factories.

"I'm sorry, of course, that conditions make it impossible for you to float through college on flowery beds of ease," but let me tell you, you'll enjoy school ever so much more if you pay for it all yourself," declares Miss Florence E. Wallace of Wooster, a senior, whose essay was in the form of a letter to a friend to whom she divulged her experiences in working her way through school.

Miss Wallace laid down three rules to which she adheres. They are:

"First, pocket your false pride. Be proud only of being able to pay your own way.

"Second, take any job that offers, no matter how disagreeable, or poorly paid. That kind of work, well done, usually leads to something better.

"Third, let everyone know you are willing to work. It pays to advertise."

Miss Wallace said her expenses during her first year in college were less than \$200. By the time her junior year was completed, her expenditures reached \$225. This year, which will include her graduation, she estimates \$300 will be sufficient to meet all requirements.

Miss Wallace has earned money both summers and winters. Her favorite odd-job is waiting table.

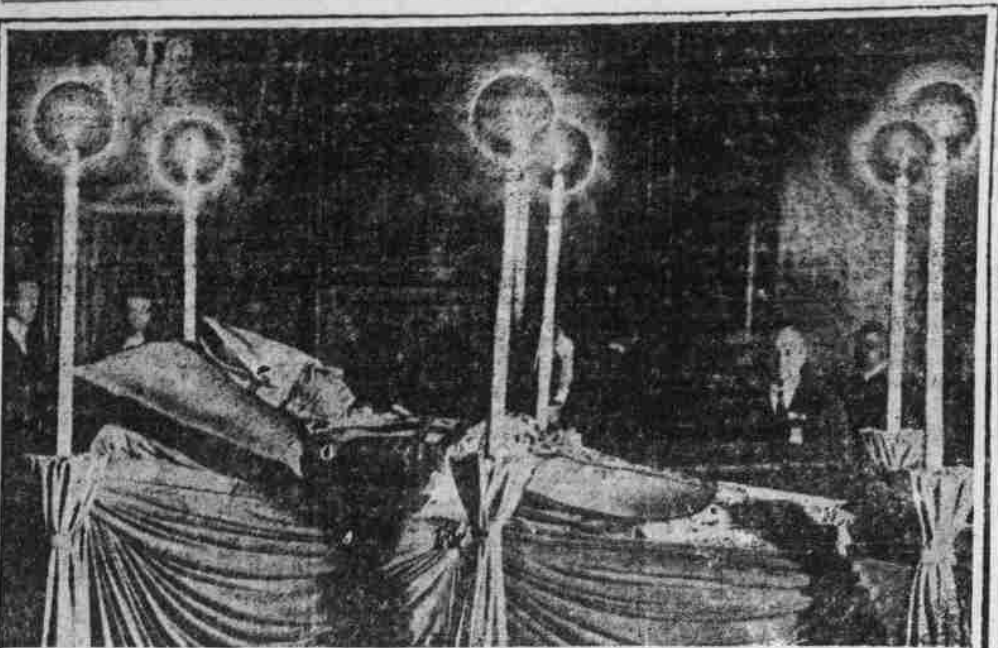
"I started when I was in high school," she confessed, "and I have become quite expert."

I have served at the country club, at college affairs, at private dinners and at three summer hotels. I have worked on Saturdays at a shoe store, and later at a clothing store. The objection to Saturday work is that nearly all the college games and parties come on that day.

"I do not use a typewriter, but I have found office work to do. I have addressed thousands of envelopes. Last summer, profiting by the training I received in the science in which I am majoring, I procured laboratory employment and saved \$200 during vacation. I have taken care of babies, done housework for faculty wives, and when I was a freshman, I worked in a factory one vacation and did sweat-shop work at home for 12 1/2 cents an hour.

"Like the widow's cruse, I've always abounded with opportunities for work. It seems as if I never need extra money without extra work appearing. Sometimes I've wished I were twins so I could do two jobs simultaneously. I've often been able to get work for other girls, and many of them have been kind in remembering me for the same purpose."

Harding Approves Reintroduction of Knox Peace Plans

Washington, April 5.—President Harding is understood to have approved immediate re-introduction of the Knox peace resolution when congress convenes next week. Final decision has not been reached, however, it was indicated by republican leaders, as to when it would be pressed for adoption.

Hopes are said to be entertained in administration circles that definite progress toward a concord of nations on a new world peace program might be possible within a short time. For that reason, it was intimated, a period of three months or so might be allowed to elapse before action on the resolution was taken by congress.

Republican senators were said to be generally in accord with respect to the Knox resolution. Several of these senators held an informal conference last night.

It was said that the only important question now open with reference to the Knox resolution was the time for its adoption and the possibility of an amendment to declare the attitude of the United States should world peace again be threatened by Germany.

Settlement of Strike Sought By Parliament

London, April 4.—Regulations to meet the emergency brought about by the strike of coal miners in Great Britain were dismissed by both houses of parliament here today. Prime Minister Lloyd-George, who called a meeting of the cabinet for early this morning, was expected to go before the house of commons and endorse the announcement made Saturday by Sir Robert Stevenson Horne, chancellor of the exchequer that the government would refuse to yield on the point of subsidizing the miners' wages.

A feeling is growing, says the Daily Graphic, that the negotiations on the proposed new wage scale broke down too abruptly and that an attempt may be made by the house of commons to bring the parties together once more.

33 Lose Lives In Train Wreck

Eagle Pass, Texas, April 4.—Thirty-three persons were killed in a collision between a freight and passenger train on the Mexican National line at Villa Garza, between Parraron and Monterey, according to reports here today. The time of the accident was not given. The only identified person killed was Victor Villareal, candidate for mayor of Piedras Negras, the town opposite Eagle Pass, the report said.

Guard Officers Will Distribute Victory Medals

Through orders from the war department, Major James S. Dusenbury, instructor-inspection officer of the Oregon national guard, has been designated as medal officer and will have charge of the distribution of victory medals to all ex-service men who have not received them.

The distribution of the medals was formerly handled by recruiting officers, but since recent orders have withdrawn recruiting stations from a large number of towns, it has been placed in the hands of the national guard. Under the new orders it is required that a commission officer shall see the discharge.

And ex-service man can obtain a victory medal by mailing his discharge to Major Dusenbury, in care of the adjutant general's office here, or by calling in person.

Mexicans Deport Yank.
Mexico City, April 5.—Linn A. E. Gale, an American radical, who was arrested here Friday night, has been deported from Mexico by the way of Vera Cruz. It is said by newspapers of this city. There is a general impression here, however, that he has been taken to Laredo to be turned over to United States authorities.
