

# Storm Ties Up Traffic In Rockies

## Worst Weather of Winter Visited On Mountain States Friday

Denver, Colo., April 16.—The Rocky Mountain regions today were slowly recovering from the effects of the worst storm of the winter, which yesterday covered the district with a snow covering ranging from 11 to 14 inches, blocked railroads and paralyzed wire communication in most directions from Denver.

**Train Service Annulled.**  
Train service to the south, annulled last night, was expected to be resumed today. Wire service, however, was not expected to return to normal immediately because of the large number of poles torn down by the wind and weight of the snow.

Some damage to livestock was anticipated when the outlying districts can be communicated with. Temperatures below freezing occurred last night in most parts of the state.

**Wires Paralyzed.**  
Chicago, April 16.—Telegraphic communication in the west and southern sections of the country are practically paralyzed today, according to reports received by telegraph companies here this morning.

The reports show there was no communication whatever between Chicago and Omaha and that the wires are in bad condition all along the line reaching from Denver southeastward and including Dallas, Texas; Little Rock, Ark.; Shreveport, La.; Memphis, Tenn.; New Orleans, St. Louis, Nashville, Chattanooga, Birmingham and Cincinnati.

The weather bureau reported the storm to be moving southeastward. Chicagoans awoke this morning to face a gale of high velocity, accompanied by a cold driving rain. Small damage is reported this far north.

**Dubuque Snowbound.**  
Dubuque, Iowa, April 16.—Dubuque is snowbound and struggling to extricate itself from the effects of one of the most severe blizzards experienced in this section of the country at this time of the year for almost a decade. Seven inches of snow fell during the night.

Total receipts of the Corvallis postoffice for this quarter were \$18,501.22, as compared with \$10,028.55 for the first three months of last year.

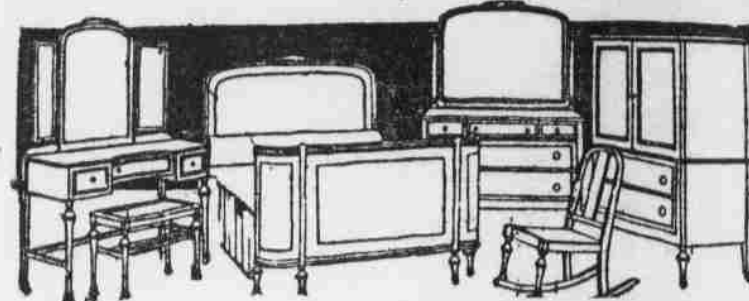
